A Guide to Visiting Cities By Boris Sieverts

1. Get topographic maps with a scale of 1:25,000 of your city. (Available at the local planning department)
2. Find out which neighborhoods are underrepresented or missing from the self-image of the city.
3. Visit those places. Find out what is special about them. Stay in these places for a while. Take photos of places, things and people that you think are typical and photographable at the same time. Talk to people who have been in these places for longer than you have.
4. Develop your photos and make prints. What do you see? What is not visible from the photos? Could it even be captured in a photograph?
5. Go back to those places. Be patient. Just sit back and let the boredom pass.
6. Go back several times with and without a camera. Start conversations, have coffee in the most unassuming cafes. Get drunk in the middle of the day. Sober up in an inappropriate place. Come back with a sleeping bag and a tent or stay in a pension, a bed and breakfast or a small hotel.
7. Go back to the planning department to get maps and aerial photographs covering a smaller area of your interest at a scale of 1:5000. Get two copies and mount one set to a contiguous image and hang it on the wall of your apartment or your office (In case you don't have enough wall space rent a space with sufficiently large wall-space for that time.
8. Let the image do its work. Compare the structure of the places you found underrepresented in step 2 with those places that seem to be stamped with the identity of the place. What do you see? Try to put it in words. Take notes.
9. Hang the maps and aerial photographs in scale 1:5000 next to your topographical maps in scale 1:25,000. Compare. Memorize everything as well as you can. Put the second set of maps and aerial photographs into a roll and make them part of your travel equipment.
10. Let the project rest. Spend some days or weeks at your day-job or travel to countries far away. As your desire to continue the investigation increases you will gain clarity about the character of your project.
11. Never read the local newspaper. The superficiality of their observation is in contrast to the weight that the printed paper gives it. That would lead you in false directions and set you back. Probably each of your own observations has more weight at this point.
12. Instead visit the archives of administrative offices, housing agencies, the local memorabilia shelves of antique shops, map archives, image archives, historical associations. Breathe the spirit of those places.
13. Persistently follow the questions that you encounter. Not in order to find the truth, but in order to hear a lot; that helps to dissolve the boundary between internal images and factuality.
14. Vary and elaborate on steps 1 to 13 until you feel competent enough for steps 15 to 19.
15. Imagine you would have to turn your most private, your innermost feelings outside and you could neither speak or write. But you know those places. Which places would you show to tell something about you? In what order would you display them as to increase their effect?
16. A person you talk to comes from a neighborhood that is prominent in the self image of the city. What feeling for this 'terra incognita' would you like to give that person?
17. What are the identity-creating elements that this 'terra-incognita' has itself? Don't fall into the trap of urban planners and local politicians but rather recognize these elements for what they are. Most of the time you will walk around them.
18. Are there sensations? If yes what are they? Do these sensations express something more clearly that permeates the whole area – like some smells that you can only sense very close to the ground? Use it at all cost! (Even if the volume of these sensations forces you to redesign the whole arc of your story). Other sensations are useless, but will rarely exist anyways.
19. Take friends and strangers to your personal places. Risk embarrassing moments. Put your preferences in words that express these preferences and give the grounds for them. Memorize the formulations that make the embarrassment disappear.
20. Fine-tune your approach over the years.

Subject: Police officers at my home?

Sunday at about 10:20 AM I was working on my kitchen. I was pulling down trim from around my door. Both Burien police and King County sheriffs came onto my private property and three officers held guns directly at me and told me to leave my property and walk toward them. None of them announced their intentions or why they were pointing guns at me. When I reached the edge of my driveway I was physically turned around by a Burien police officer to be cuffed. While he was doing this a different officer went into my private home and hand cuffed a good friend of mine and drug him to the cruiser and locked him inside. Then they asked what cars in front of my house were mine and what was my name, officer Marisipian (?) told me that I didn't have to be cuffed and let me turn around. By then there were about eight different cruisers blocking the main road with two very long lines of my neighbors watching me and a long time friend being cuffed in front of my own house. Then a couple of minutes later the officer let my friend out of the cruiser and the officer that cuffed me got inappropriately frustrated with me because I was "not letting him get a word in edgewise" got into his cruiser. Then an officer Hayden walked up and told me "my life was going to be hard and complicated with an attitude like that" and continued with the exact same statements of the first officer telling me that I need to be happy that this is what happened to me and then at almost the exact same point in the explanation said, "I can see that you are not going to let me get a word in edgewise either". Then he drove off. I went inside to call the Sheriffs Dept. and spoke to a Sgt. Rob Mathis I told him that I wanted to file a complaint and/or report and he asked, "for what?". After about 20 minutes on the phone I finally got an apology, but was told that there wasn't anything that I could do about being held at gun point on my own property.

I grew up in Pennsylvania where guns are a common place object and I have never in my life had one person aim a loaded weapon at my chest let alone three officers all reacting to my movements and each others. I see sheriffs at Young's and Huckleberry Square and a couple of other establishments all the time. Even if they don't recognize me as a friend they should at least be able to tell that the guy wearing brand new jeans a \$200.00 jacket and new pair of sneakers standing in the back door to his own house might look familiar enough to take pause. I obviously didn't fit the "description" of some one in a position to break and enter.

I will be voting against any property levies in the future that have to do with law enforcement. This situation has left me with a fear of the local police force and likewise all respect has dissolved.

In the three years that I have lived in this house I have seen the police maybe three or four times ever drive by. Now when some one is trying to prank the police force I get held at gun point by three people and my house is surrounded by eight to ten cruisers.

Please take action to ensure that this doesn't ever happen again. And restore my faith in my government.

Dear City Council members,

I am writing to express my concern about the fate of Burien's homeless pets, and the future of the Burien Animal Control agency. I have volunteered at PAWS and worked there as a Volunteer Coordinator, and I have volunteered at Seattle Animal Shelter and at the SFSPCA. I have seen the daily workings of various shelter organizations and have known and worked with their staff personally. I am extremely dismayed at the system that has been in place over the past 9 months under Dr. Leslie Kasper's operation, and am shocked she was given the contract by the Burien City Council to begin with. It undermines the credibility of the City Council to choose a suitable sheltering organization for Burien's lost and homeless pets. I am glad this situation is being remedied, and as the city considers the next move for the welfare of its' residents pets, I truly hope it hears its resident's concerns about finding a positive solution.

Sherry Meyers seems qualified to operate as Animal Placement Coordinator, but neither Michael J. Snyder Sr. or Guy Knepp appear to be qualified for their proposed roles. Anyone involved in a shelter needs more than an "Intro to Animal Control" course on their resume. Have any of them worked or volunteered at an actual city shelter, or even been inside one? Do they have the qualifications to be hired in these roles in another city? Look at the job requirements at the Seattle Animal Shelter for these respective positions. Talk to Don Jordan about a referral for a director, or Annette Laico at PAWS. Burien is trying to reinvent the wheel when the city has no experience with said wheel. It isn't that hard to do this right. We are not the first city to run an animal shelter.

Is there a volunteer program planned as part of Burien Animal Control? A foster program? A veterinary fund and referral network? A spay/neuter program? A feral cat program? A plan to isolate and TREAT sick animals (not euthanize them) away from the healthy population? An adoption outreach program? A referral network for chronically ill or geriatric pets?

Running a shelter involves the need for all these programs and more, with qualified staff/volunteers to implement and run them. The city of Burien needs to be held accountable for providing a qualified group who can answer these needs. So far, Burien has shown itself to know not one thing about running a shelter, or how to vet (no pun intended) candidates for the contract (track records, etc). We need PROVEN SUCCESS with animal sheltering best practices. This is not some backwater town. We are part of a major metro area. We

should expect the BEST, and the best certainly is available to us. We don't need Burien residents or local business owners in order to do a good job, we need sheltering specialists with BACKGROUND in SHELTERING and animal welfare. Burien needs an animal behavior specialist to determine whether and animal is capable of being rehabilitated or is truly fractious so we don't kill pets at our shelter who are simply scared or stressed. At the same time, Burien needs someone who will be the compassionate soul to provide humane end of life treatment to those truly untreatable, terminally ill animals; someone experienced with proper procedures and with coping with the emotional aspects of the task. It's an entirely different realm from being a veterinarian, or a dog trainer, or a Posh Puppy grooming salon owner, or a breeder, in fact breeding goes against the philosophy behind spay/neuter altogether, and the problem of pet overpopulation.

Burien should find someone familiar with or from No Kill King County: <http://www.nokillkingcounty.org/> and someone who has been to conferences held by No Kill Advocacy: <http://www.nokilladvocacycenter.org/> to develop a state of the art, forward thinking, model shelter. There are plenty of local, existing models to work from, but I believe Burien can and should be ahead of the King County curve with a kinder, gentler way to protect pets. We should do better than PAWS, or Seattle Humane. We should do at least as well as Seattle Animal Shelter.

But, it appears that some local business people continue to view the Burien Animal Control contract as a lottery windfall to supplement their income. These are not people concerned or experienced with the welfare of our vulnerable lost and homeless pets. These are people concerned with self advancement. It is a sickening prospect that there are those who will try to profit off the misfortune of vulnerable animals. The fate of vulnerable homeless pets is not a ticket to financial salvation. The contract as the city offers it is not enough to cover the cost of sheltering animals responsibly with all the best practices in the field, let alone bring in extra take home income.

As a passionate animal welfare advocate and activist and resident of Burien, I expect City Council to provide the residents of Burien with a humane, safe, progressive homeless pet advocacy coalition. We all want to know our own pets would be safe if they ever got lost, and that we would know where to find them and that they would be treated well in the meantime. I also want to know that strays and other homeless animals will be healthy, and find a safe and humane life for themselves after an encounter with animal services, and that they will not end up "euthanized"/killed.

Burien pet owners are forced to trust the best judgment of City Council. I hope you will prove that this trust is founded and deserved.

The purpose of this agenda item is to continue the discussion on animal control services for Burien.		
BACKGROUND (Include prior Council action & discussion):		
In April 2010, the Burien City Council chose not to participate in King County's proposed regional animal control system and directed staff to develop an alternative program. In June, the City Manager executed the animal control services contract between the City of Burien and Dr. Leslie Kasper, for sheltering and field services. In January, Dr. Kasper gave the City six months notice that she would no longer be providing animal control services for Burien. Staff then republished the request for proposals for providing animal control services in the City.		
Last week, council met the proposed contractor that would provide animal control services going forward and reviewed the contract. Councilmember Block suggested that staff look at the City of Des Moines program as a model for bringing animal control services in-house. Council asked staff to provide comparison data for the program that contractor would provide for \$120,000 and the City of Des Moines program, which has a budget of \$121,000. That comparison is attached.

In-House vs. Contract for Animal Control Services

Summary:

The comparison below is based strictly on the cost to provide animal control services via the contract that is before the Burien City Council versus the cost of providing those services in-house in Des Moines. The actual cost of providing in-house services in Burien would likely be somewhat different. For example; hiring an Animal Control Officer (ACO) for the city of Burien, with its population of almost 50,000 residents, may be more expensive than in Des Moines, with its population of 32,000.

The two methods of service delivery, in-house and contract, are alike in that both satisfy the statutory requirements regarding animal control. That is, they address the need to respond to dangerous animals and situations involving animal cruelty. They differ most in that the CARES proposal includes a more comprehensive approach, including public outreach, education and aggressive adoption. Adding those elements would add additional labor cost to the in-house model. It is difficult to estimate, but it is reasonable to think the cost would be \$25,000 to \$50,000 annually depending on the level of effort.

City officials, citizens and staff from the Burien PaRCS Department will be gathering at 11:00 am on Wednesday, April 13 at the South Shelter in Seahurst Park to mark Arbor Day as well as Earth Day. A Mayoral Proclamation will also be read out at the event (see attached). The City is celebrating the 139th anniversary of Arbor Day and will be recognized for its 10th year as a Tree City USA by the national Tree City USA organization by its representative from Washington's Department of Natural Resources. Burien PaRCS will be planting a celebratory tree in honor of these annual holidays marking environmental awareness and community sustainability. Staff and others will also take the opportunity to remember Jay Powers, a park maintenance worker for the City of Burien contracted through TruGreen Landcare who passed away in December 2010. Adjacent to the tree, a plaque is being placed which honors the memory of Mr. Powers as a dedicated, hard working and kind person who was known to many people in the community through his years of service in Burien's parks.

C. National League of Cities Leadership Academy

Economic Development Manager, Dick Loman, has been awarded a competitive scholarship by the National League of Cities to participate in the upcoming Trade Development Alliance of Greater Seattle, Leadership Academy, April 19-21. The scholarship is worth \$500. The goal of the Academy is to increase the competitiveness of U.S. Cities and specifically to encourage economic relationships between China and the United States. Attendees will have the opportunity to discuss direct Chinese investment in U.S. cities with Chinese investors and central government officials, including Mr. Zhu, Vice Minister of Finance for China.

D. Dennis Clark Leaves County and Miller/Walker Creek Stewardship

Dennis Clark is leaving his job with King County after four years of working with the citizens of Burien to care for the land and waters of the Miller and Walker Creek Basins. Dennis is moving north to Anacortes where he will be the Assistant Division Manager in charge of the Orca Straits District of the Aquatic Resources Division. Dennis has worked with many of Burien's residents in volunteer efforts to clear invasive weeds and plants in our basins, maintain stream flow and also dealt with Burien's busy beavers when their dams have threatened to flood neighbor's homes. We all wish him well in his new endeavor and will miss his enthusiasm and hard work.

E. Local Teacher/School Receives 2011 Earth/Heroes at School Environmental Award (Pg. 61)

Teacher Beverly Mowrer and students from New Start High School have been selected to receive the 2011 Earth Heroes at School Award by King County. County Executive Dow Constantine will give the award at a recognition ceremony on Thursday, April 14 from 4:30 to 6:30 PM at the Mercer Island Community Center. They were nominated for the award (see attached) by Lisa Aumann from the Burien Parks, Recreation & Cultural Services (PaRCS) Department for their efforts in the City's Adopt-a-Park program and their related environmental education programming. Ms. Mowrer has also been nominated by the Dept. as an Outstanding

Teacher for the Highline Schools Foundation Gold Star Award. Winners of that award will be announced on May 13.

F. North Highline Annexation Mediation (Pg. 63)

Scott Greenberg and Jenn Ramirez Robson represented the City of Burien at a mediation session requested by the City of Seattle related to an overlapping Potential Annexation Area (PAA) between Seattle and Tukwila. The overlap is in the NE corner of the unincorporated area adjacent to the Duwamish River. This area is not in Burien's PAA. As we expected, the issues related to this PAA overlap pertain only to Seattle, Tukwila and King County. Therefore, we will not be participating in future mediation related to this PAA overlap.

G. 1st Avenue S. Phase 2 –ROW Services–Wrap Up

Public Works held a meeting with Perteet Engineering and Certified Land Services on April 4, 2011 to turnover project information and conclude right-of-way (ROW) and easement acquisition services for the 1st Avenue South Phase 2 project. Services resulted in ROW and easement acquisitions for 27 parcels and ROW certification by WSDOT and the FHWA. With ROW certification, City will now be seeking advertisement approval for construction in the next three weeks.

H. Permit Updates


- Decanter Wines, a new business located at 15830 1st Ave. S., Ste. 104 was issued a Certificate of Occupancy on March 25, 2011.



Mike Milan welcomed the Steering Committee. Brian Scott outlined the meeting agenda and asked members to briefly introduce themselves. One of the objectives of this Steering Committee meeting is to figure out the questions we want to ask at the upcoming Community Meetings to better understand what Burien values and wants the city's future to look like. This will help the Steering Committee make recommendations to the City Council in June.

Process Update & Upcoming Events -- Information

Brian Scott reviewed visioning process diagram in the meeting packet including the schedule, and upcoming events.

Upcoming meetings for your calendars

- **3 Community Meetings** to continue to gather input from the community:
 - Saturday, **April 16**, 10 am, at Seahurst Elementary;
 - Tuesday, **April 26**, 5:30 pm at Hazel Valley Elementary; and
 - Saturday, **May 7**, 10 a.m., at Southern Heights Elementary
- **Next Steering Committee Meeting - May 17th, 2011** - This will be a joint meeting with the City Council to determine key issues based on input to-date and the results of the Community Meetings.

Community Forum Plans -- Information & Discussion

Brian described the how the Community Meetings will go. There are two parts to the meeting:



1st part of meeting will be a one hour Open House designed to encourage residents/participants to Think Big. It will include 6 stations where participants can to find out about the visioning process and City and give *individual* input. It is an opportunity to interact at their own pace. See the Community Forum description from the packet for more details.

Steering Committee members are welcome to and encouraged to come to the Community Meetings to help and listen at the stations!

The 2nd hour will be a guided program, with everyone in a large group, involving an issues discussion and ranking. He'll describe issues from tonight meeting and encourage dialog among community. Community members will have an opportunity to vote electronically at the meeting on the issues. This is a chance for direct input and doesn't require participants to stand in front of a room full of people.

Spanish language interpreters will be present and other languages can be accommodated if we get advance notice.

Rachel Levine suggested keeping straight the feedback from the different meetings, so we know what feedback came from which meeting.

Scot Rastelli asked how the events are being advertised. Jenn gave a list of ways including: the City's newsletter, reader boards, Facebook page, reaching out to community groups to include it in their publications (e.g. church bulletins), community radio 540 am, elementary schools weekly packet and middle and high schools (method tbd). Rachel said she announced them at the Library Guild Meeting. Butch offered to put poster up at the Boulevard Park Thriftway. It was suggested that the Community Centers get the word out with personal interactions too.

There was discussion of improving the outreach to Spanish speakers. Maureen Hoffman commented that the Spanish translation link small on the web site is too small and doesn't stand out. She suggested translating the visioning page to Spanish also. Jenn noted that the Spanish info line has information about the Community Meetings and visioning process on it. City is also depending on word of mouth in the Latino community via Latinos For Transformation and New futures. Brian Scott noted that the Latino Affinity Group was the best attended group and Genesis interpreted for her mother. Several others attendees interpreted too.

The group asked for a copy for 1995 Vision and examples of things accomplished as a result. There was some discussion about the broadness and vagueness of the 1995 Vision. Our goal is to have more specific goals/statements of community values and guidance come out of this process.



Banners or other very large means of promoting were suggested by the Steering Committee to get some more visibility for the Visioning and meetings.

Rod Robbins asked about affinity groups. Brian Scott said participation was beyond expectations. More on specifics below.

There was a question about greeters at the event. They will welcome community members and help them through the process. Again, Steering Committee members are welcome to come help with this!

Community Input to Date (web survey & affinity groups) -- Information

Brian gave a presentation on input to date.

The first phase of the web survey is done and the Affinity Groups are complete. The meeting packet also included a summary of the input. The survey does not give a scientific sample of the community; respondents were self-selected.

- The distribution of the web survey responses pretty closely matched the distribution of Affinity groups.
- Map with distribution of responses shows that people more areas of the City responded to the web survey. Very little white on map.
- There was more participation form in older parts of the City
- There was discussion about the lack of participation from the southern part of the city. The lack of participation is consistent with historic response to other efforts too.

The Word Cloud, again not a scientific sample, in the packet shows what folks had to say. The big words are those were used most often.

The top Values were fairly concentrated in a few topics and the Fears were more spread out across the topics. Diversity covers ethnic, business, and economic commercial. The Town Square concerns included comments about the vacancies there to concern about national stores coming in and doing damage to Main Street businesses. These are also reflective of the concern about change. Annexation comments were on both sides of it: for& against.

The wall charts from all of the Affinity Groups are on the City's web site. Here are some highlights presented at the Steering Committee meeting:

- Arts group discussed facilities, resources and a passion for diversity and the independent nature of Burien.
- Business group wanted to see more economic development from City going forward
- Education group had a lot of interest in how city can help kids be ready to learn after/before school. Mike Milan noted there was only one male present as opposed to the other groups which were more gender balanced.
- Health and wellness group found that Burien could be capitalizing on the



- cluster of facilities/services that have chosen to locate here.
- Recreation group gave up a sunny weekend morning to attend discussion was not the most dynamic. They want more of what Burien has.
- Seniors group showed passion for community, concern for fellow citizens. In relation to crime, they were concerned that others might be fearful and had questions about how to interact with changing diversity - how do you make community with that. Rachel pointed out that the group is aware that to age in place and they need to deal with / talk with neighbors.
- Shoreline group had a lot to say. Some concern expressed that more emphasis might be placed on other groups input. There was discussion about whether more public access to the shoreline would facilitate protecting it or cause more harm.
- 20 Somethings met at a pub in the evening and were passionate about community - a lot of energy while having a hard time articulating what they'd like to see.
- Transportation group was well attended by proponents of alternate forms of transportation, lots of cyclists. They were concerned with raising community awareness and acceptance of alternative transportation.

Rose Clark, who attended quite a few of the Affinity Groups reported that she was impressed with positive comments. Maureen Hoffman asked how participants were chosen. The City cast wide net, and did not hand pick. Some people showed up that we didn't expect and that was fine. Mostly the effort was to build to the community meetings.

Challenges & Opportunities (draft for Community Forums)

Brian Scott reviewed and the group discussed the "Input Synthesis/ Emerging Themes/ Key Questions DRAFT" in the packet. Comments are recorded in the wall chart transcription.

The Steering Committee worked to help identify "What's the question?" for each theme that has emerged from the input so far.

The goal for the new vision for Burien is to have statements specific is enough that you could get your mind around then and that the community/City could implement.

Questions discussed during the Steering Committee meeting include:

- Growth & change - where would you like to see growth? Ambaum corridor, single family homes, mixed use development?
- What is responsibility of the City vs individual? What would that look like to you?
- There was a discussion about permanency. Are we attracting people who have





lived here a long time or from other parts of King County to live here. Diversity sometimes equals less permanency. If we can focus on permanency we'll have a stronger future. What can we do to encourage people to stay?

- What is the role of city education beyond schools?
- What is the role of city in helping people who want to build environmentally consciously?
- How will the community be sustained over time?

The question of how to encourage Latino community to come to the community meetings was discussed. It can be frustrating when there are communication barriers. We need to let people know they are welcome and translators will be available.

The group noticed that many of the things they'd like to see are luxuries when there aren't jobs and the economy hasn't fully recovered. Discussion shifted to economic concerns and ways to promote jobs.

- The highest portion of B&O revenue comes from car dealerships. Is that what we want to be known for?
- What sectors do we want to develop?
- Do we want to encourage small business & restaurants or lure big box stores?
- What about basics instead of high end shops?

Crime was also discussed. About 50% of the City's budget goes to fighting crime. To some, police seem to be on top of crime - handling it well, responding promptly. The connection between poverty and higher crime was acknowledged.





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Background/Methods:

New Start High School in the Highline School District is an alternative high school generally serving "at risk" students. The school focuses on providing learning in a non-traditional format. The school over the past couple of years worked with King County to provide some restoration efforts to Salmon Creek Park, a King County maintained park adjacent to their school. The school started this process by developing a native plant nursery for propagating plants to be installed in the park.

In April 2010, the City of Burien annexed this unincorporated King County area and took over maintenance of Salmon Creek Park. By September, the school contacted the City of Burien to formalize their stewardship commitment at the park. In November teacher Beverly Mowrer helped launch a collaborative project of habitat restoration and science education at Salmon Creek Park and a Burien open space called Salmon Creek Ravine.

The initial phase of this collaboration effort was three weeks long, November 29-December 17, 2010 with students working M-TH from 9-3 pm each day just on this science project. The idea was to do some classroom learning about native plants and habitats, learning science components such as plant identification and care, removing invasive plant species and restoring park areas with native plants (identifying which plants will thrive in what conditions) and a component on water testing. The students integrated their learning by working at the park adjacent to the school and at the second open space, Salmon Creek Ravine. This project was a collaborative effort by Mrs. Mowrer and her students, a local Burien non-profit called Environmental Science Center and the City of Burien. The school's restoration and native plant maintenance efforts will continue during 2011.

The student's results for this partnership project were an innovative approach to learning science in a real world context. The results for City of Burien were two improved park habitats. Salmon Creek Park, located adjacent to the school, had 9,000

square feet of park space cleared of Himalayan blackberry and English ivy. The students also replanted this area with over 200 native plants mostly grown at their school nursery and some provided by the City of Burien. The native plant species included nootka rose, salal, snowberry, Oregon grape, sword fern, and twinberry. The second site, Salmon Creek Ravine, had 5,000 square feet of habitat cleared also containing invasive blackberry and ivy. The student's prepared the area for a community group to come back through and install native plants, half of the installed plants were donated from the student's native plant nursery.

This project had a positive impact on student learning since the implementation of the three week curriculum included classroom time to teach science concepts, integrated outdoor field work using the classroom concepts and ultimately completing a project from start to finish. An additional byproduct of this project was teambuilding, learning to work with other students as well as adult volunteers from the community.

The impact of this project on the local environment is huge. The City of Burien gained 14,000 square feet of restored habitat at two park sites. Overall this work had a minimal cost to city resources. Typically, this type of restoration and maintenance is not included in the general maintenance work plan so the city relies on volunteers to help improve our park areas overrun with invasive plants.

The benefits of this project extend beyond the classroom as the results of this habitat restoration will be enjoyed by the entire Burien community. The restored areas, with continued student volunteer maintenance, will thrive for years to come. Working on a collaborative project with other community groups also builds positive relationships and commitments between these organizations. This project utilized classroom curriculum and student coordination through the high school; additional hands-on curriculum, experiments and field work supervision by Environmental Science Center program coordinators and volunteers; and project scope, coordination and oversight provided by the City of Burien staff. By partnering to provide education/learning from different groups the commitment level of the students and the community is greatly enhanced. The achievements of the project were shared with the New Start High School student body as well as highlighted in the Highline School District e-news newsletter <http://www.hsd401.org/ehighlights/2010/12/15/NewStartStudentsDemonstrateCitizenshipWhileLearningScience.aspx>.

The nominee, Beverly Mowrer, gives back to her community by volunteering at local adopt-a-park and outdoor environmental events. She helps provide native habitat restoration at work parties scheduled through the City of Burien when her schedule allows. She also looks for opportunities to share her knowledge, experience and commitment to the environment with her students. She engages them beyond what is expected in their classroom learning.


