To the members of the Planning Commission and the City Council:

Ever since Burien elected to incorporate as a city, the majority of the Lake Burien Neighborhood and Lake Burien Shore Club members have clearly stated that the character of their neighborhood was low density residential. Additionally for the protection of the lake, its wetlands and its water quality and Miller Creek's water quality, the land use in the Lake Burien neighborhood should be low density. They went on the record in 1996, 1997, 1999, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012 stating this position on land use. Now that the Comprehensive Plan and its Land Use Map are open for revision, we are requesting this again. As long as the Plan remains open, citizens have a right to request that land use be examined. Mr. Greenberg stated at the July 12, 2011 meeting that this could be possible. **The Lake Burien Neighborhood has met the timeline for this request in 2012.**

When this request was put on the docket in 2010, the City Staff that prepared the material for the request presentation to the Planning Commission included several inaccuracies in their presentation that resulted in an inaccurate perception of the situation. These inaccuracies included:

1. current density of land use
2. misinformation on wetlands and how they are measured
3. an inaccurate map of the Lake Burien Neighborhood, Lake Burien and its critical areas
4. misinterpretation of how Growth Management Numbers are required for a city by the Puget Sound Regional Council
5. error in not consulting the EIS and the required mitigations for the Lake Burien Area
6. inaccurate information on the surrounding neighborhoods
7. misinformation on the adequacy of the current facilities that the city has for the area.

While the staff later corrected some of these inaccuracies, some of the Planning Commissioners still remained confused about what were the real facts for this request for a change to the Land Use Map.

Further on, some City Council members remained confused about the whole process of what criteria was to be considered in voting on an amendment to a Land Use Map. They then voted on the Lake Burien Neighborhood request based on what they believed was a Growth Management Board decision on the Burien Comprehensive Plan. It turns out that this case never existed and was never ruled on.

The conditions for the Lake Burien Neighborhood have markedly changed since that request was considered in 2010. The changes are:

1. The water quality of Lake Burien significantly declined in late 2010 and 2011 due to inadequate storm water management facilities for the area. The city has neither the money nor the resources to remedy this problem or to adequately upgrade the facilities in the next 10 to 15 years-if ever. The floodings and algae problems continue to be evidence of this inadequacy.
2. Evidence has been provided that clearly shows that the Growth Management Board never heard or made a ruling on the case or voted on the situation that the Council based its vote on.
3. The City Staff clarified how growth management numbers were to be determined in the city at its January 24, 2012 Planning Commission Meeting.

The Lake Burien Neighborhood is requesting that the Burien Comprehensive Land Use Map be amended to show the Lake Burien Neighborhood as Low Density Residential as it meets the criteria for this change. It is requesting that its request be placed on the docket for 2012.







SUBJECT: Public Meeting on 2012 Comprehensive Plan Amendment Docket

PURPOSE

On June 12, 2012, the Planning Commission held a public meeting to consider testimony and make a recommendation to the City Council on which amendments to consider as part of the city's 2012 Comprehensive Plan amendment docket. The Commission decided to continue discussion at their June 26, 2012 meeting. The information below is identical to the memo presented to the Commission in their June 12, 2012 meeting packet.

BMC 19.65.095.2.A and B describe the current stage of the amendment process:

- A. By May 1, property owners and other interested parties will be notified of the annual Comprehensive Plan amendment request deadline. The amendment request deadline is June 1.
- B. The *Director* will create the list of eligible amendments submitted by the public, the City Council, the Planning Commission, and City staff. By July 1, the Planning Commission shall hold at least one public meeting to consider testimony and make recommendations to the City Council on which amendments to consider, and may recommend a priority be assigned to each proposed amendment.

BACKGROUND

The City of Burien adopted its first comprehensive plan in 1997 and in 2003 the city completed a major update to the plan in order for it to be consistent with updates to the Growth Management Act, regional planning and county planning documents. Generally since the adoption of the first plan in 1997 the city has been making annual amendments to the original version and those can be characterized as additive in nature.

In July 2011, the City Council concurred with the Comprehensive Plan amendment docket as recommended by the Planning Commission and passed Resolution 322 accepting the 2011-2012 docket (Attachment 1). The docket was characterized as a two year work program. The Commission has working through the docket since last year.

A public notice of the annual amendment process was issued on April 15, 2012. There were no eligible amendments submitted by the June 1, 2012 deadline. However, correspondence is attached asking the Commission and City Council to review the land use map for the Lake Burien neighborhood as part of the 2012 amendment docket (Attachment 2).





To Whom It May Concern:

The Burien Comprehensive Plan is currently open for an update/review. This is the time that land use in the city should be looked at for update and the land use map should be examined for updates and corrections also.

The Lake Burien Neighborhood (162 petitioners) is requesting that the land use for Lake Burien Neighborhood be placed on the Comprehensive Plan docket for 2012. This is the appropriate time that this request be submitted. Currently, the Lake Burien Neighborhood is shown as Moderate Density Residential on the Land Use Map. In fact, the Lake Burien Neighborhood is Low Density Residential by description in the Comprehensive Plan and is required to be so by the mitigation required in the EIS of the Plan. Leaving it as moderate density on the Comprehensive Plan Land Use Map is a violation and a conflict with the Comprehensive Plan.

Additionally, the most recent approved decision related to the Group Health request for a change to the Comprehensive Plan-2011 demonstrates that the city was in error in how it considered Growth Management Numbers for the Lake Burien Neighborhood.

As the Planning Commission cancelled its last meeting, this request could not be brought before them prior to the June 1, 2012 deadline for requests for change to the Comprehensive Plan Map. Therefore, the Lake Burien Neighborhood is making this request in writing to the Burien Planning Dept., Planning Commission and the City Council prior to the deadline for their consideration.

1. The Lake Burien Neighborhood has a density of less than four single family residential units per acre.
2. The Lake Burien Neighborhood is situated on a critical area-the current critical areas map shows this.
3. Relative to other residential areas within the City, the area is characterized by lower density development as shown on the LU-2 Map.
4. Maintaining the area at low density will serve a public need and public good to protect water quality.
5. Low density for the area is compatible with the surrounding neighborhood of Seahurst which it abuts on 2 sides.
6. The City has been unable and will continue to be unable to provide the mitigations and improvements to the storm water system that are necessary for the protection of water quality in Lake Burien. The City lacks the necessary resources to do this and there are constant problems with storm water and non-point pollution to the lake because of the lack of necessary facilities.
7. The City has an excess of Growth Management Number Units so that the loss of a few housing units from the Lake Burien Neighborhood will not effect its ability to meet its quota.

The City lost over 100 units in the Group Health project in 2011 and that was determined to be of no significance by both the staff and the Council.

8. The current Comprehensive Plan requires as its mitigation to the EIS that the Lake Burien Neighborhood remain low density.

9. The Lake Burien Neighborhood-as did Group Health project-contents that an error was made in 1999 when the Comprehensive Plan Map was altered. This error needs to be corrected so that the Plan and the Map are in agreement with each other. Under the policies for the Plan and the GMA, these two documents may not be in disagreement or incompatible. They must be consistent.

Therefore, the Lake Burien Neighborhood is requesting that a review of Land Use Map for the Lake Burien Neighborhood be placed on the 2012 Comprehensive Plan Docket.

RE Item for the Comprehensive Plan Update-Land Use in the Lake Burien Neighborhood

To the Planning Commissioners and the City Council Members;

The Lake Burien Neighborhood(162 petitioners) have requested that the land use for the Lake Burien Neighborhood be placed on the Comprehensive Plan Update docket that will be occurring during the next year-2011. This is the appropriate time that neighborhoods and citizens have the right to request that land use in the city be reviewed. We asked for this at the last Planning Commission Meeting and were turned down based on an argument put forth by Mr. Helms-Planning Commissioner. Mr. Helms's position was that all critical areas in all neighborhoods should be treated equally and therefore should be reviewed when the Critical Areas Ordinance comes up for review-2014. Therefore the Lake Burien Neighborhood should be looked at only when the Critical Areas Ordinance comes up for review-2014. Strangely the City Staff did not clearly explain the flaw of this argument to Mr. Helms and the other Planning Commissioners. These are the flaws;

1. The Comprehensive Plan is the guiding document for Land Use in the city. The Critical Areas Ordinance does not set the policy for land use. Therefore land use issues should be reviewed when the Comprehensive Plan comes up for review-right now.
2. Once the new Shoreline Master Plan (SMP) goes into effect, the Lake Burien and the shorelines around it will no longer be regulated by the Critical Areas Ordinance. It will be controlled by the Shoreline Master Plan and the Critical Areas Ordinance embedded in that plan. Therefore any review of the Critical Areas Ordinance in 2014 will not include the Lake Burien or a major portion of the surrounding neighborhood. And any Best Available Science Studies done for critical areas in the city will not include Lake Burien.
3. We have requested that the city include a land use study in the new SMP and the city has flatly refused to do that claiming that the appropriate time for that is during a review of the Comprehensive Plan 2011-which is now.
4. Under the Growth Management Act, this is the appropriate time to ask for a land use study of the area and the Planning Commission is claiming that this should happen during the Critical Areas Ordinance. The City Staff has clearly not communicated to the Planning Commissioners when land use should be examined and evaluated per citizen request during the Comprehensive Plan update.
5. Lake Burien and the surrounding shorelines are a one of a kind item in this city. Flatly there are no other freshwater lake shorelines in the City of Burien that have the kinds of critical areas that Lake Burien has. It cannot be looked at by Mr. Helms's invented standard of fairness that all critical areas be treated equally-as all of the critical areas in the city are not all equal.

6. To suggest per the last vote of the Planning Commission, that the next available time that land use in the Lake Burien Neighborhood can be examined is in the year 2019 or 2020 is lunacy. The SMP and the Critical Areas Ordinances cannot be used as excuses for why land use is not being examined during the Comprehensive Plan. Also, they cannot be used as excuses for why the Best Available Science standard is not being employed for the protection of a shoreline with critical areas under land use policies.

Lake Burien is a shoreline with critical areas and as such warrants protection under the Growth Management Act. The 1997 Environmental Impact Statement (EIS)-which the city is still using for this Comp Plan Update-clearly states that the land use around Lake Burien is to be low density land use-the Preferred Model. None of the Addendums to this EIS have provided any studies, mitigations, significant changes in regulations or funding plan changes that have altered the 1997 EIS for the Lake Burien Neighborhood.

Also, we-the neighbors of the Lake Burien Neighborhood- believe that the City Staff has the responsibility to educate the City Council as well as the Planning Commissioners on the purposes, contents and roles of the respective plans that drive the City's policies and regulations. It is clear that not all of the Planning Commissioners or City Council members understand the how these documents are to be used and applied. Of course it remains the responsibility of the City Council and Planning Commissioners to at least read these documents and ask the appropriate questions of the staff. Staff has the responsibility to give honest, clear responses to questions. Under the Growth Management Act, responses should be given so that a citizen of normal intelligence is able to understand the answer or the written response. That is not the way that answers are currently being provided to the public in Burien. Frequently citizen requests are not even given the courtesy of a response by the staff, Council or Planning Commission.

In a response to the Puget Sound Regional Council-2005, the City of Burien argued that the neighborhoods west of Ambaum would remain low density due to their critical areas. The same land use standard should be applied to the Lake Burien Neighborhood following that logic.

Therefore, the Lake Burien Neighbors are requesting that the land use be examined for the Lake Burien Neighborhood be examined-per its status as a shoreline with critical areas- and updated in this update to the Comp Plan and that this land use item be put on the work docket for the Comp Plan.

To the Planning Commissioners and City Council Members;

Robert Howell of the Lake Burien Neighborhood met the timelines for submitting requests for things to be put on the Comp Plan update on May 23, 2011. He turned a written copy of those requests to you and the City Council. However, that letter was never gotten to the City Council for their last meeting. Also, the table of work for the next two years put forth by the City Staff completely ignores the requests made by our neighborhood. We are requesting that the table include an update for the land use map for the Lake Burien Neighborhood and updated information on the Lake Burien Neighborhood be added to the Comprehensive Plan.

1. The 1997 EIS mitigation for the approval of the Comp Plan required that the Lake Burien Neighborhood be low density-Preferred Model. While there have been Addendums to the EIS there has never been an analysis or change in mitigation for wetlands or streams and lakes.
2. The response by the City of Burien to the Puget Sound Regional Council in 2005, stated that because of the critical areas west of Ambaum, the City was going to keep those areas low density to protect the critical areas. However, major portions of Seahurst have no critical areas and are being protected at low density while the Lake Burien Neighborhood which is on the critical areas map is not being protected at low density. This is not applying the intent of the GMA correctly. this land use needs to be examined. We are requesting that the Burien Land Use Map and policies be re-analyzed during this Comp Plan update.
3. Lake Burien is not noted as a shoreline of the city in the Comp Plan. Lake Burien is not noted as being in any drainage basin in the city in the Comp Plan. We are asking that these items be corrected in the Comp Plan documentation.

The City Staff made findings on our Comp Plan Request last year that were incorrect to avoid approving our request.

1. There never was a Keith Inness case that went before the Growth Management Hearings Board that forced the City to make the Lake Burien Neighborhood moderate density.
2. The Lake Burien Neighborhood is a distinct neighborhood and has historically documented as a neighborhood in the City's documents-it is not part of the larger Gregory Heights neighborhood.
3. The Lake Burien Neighborhood is currently low density in character and always has been. The City Staff has created models that are not supported by the PSRC and other cities on this issue.
4. The City claimed that the PSRC would not allow this neighborhood to be low density because the PSRC would not allow it. the PSRC denies that statement and says Burien can move and puts its GMA numbers anywhere it wants to. The PRSC actually supports low density as a land use model to protect critical areas like Lake Burien.
5. The City Staff claimed that Lake Burien was not a critical area and then it claimed that there were not significant amounts of critical areas in the neighborhood. Both of these claims are

untrue. Then when the Case was referred to the Growth Management Hearings Board, the City's attorney claimed that significant amounts of critical areas were not even considered in the denial of our request to be low density. Hum, very different than the discussions that were taped for both the Planning Commission as well as the City Council.

6. The City Staff claimed that there were adequate facilities and ordinances in the city to protect the critical areas of Lake Burien without changing the land use. We know that is not true as Lake Burien has not even been put into the Storm Drainage Plan as being in any drainage basin. Also there has been not major funding or planning done for Lake Burien since 1996. We have had flooding in this area-the storm outlets are not adequate or functioning correctly. The City Staff openly admit this. There is no required low impact development required in this area or the entire City to protect this drainage basin. The Critical Areas ordinance has been inadequate to protect the area-not based on Best Available Science or the no net loss standard. As a result the water quality in the lake has been degrading. Clearly there are not adequate facilities or regulations to protect this water source and its critical areas.

7. The City Staff claimed that the protect of water quality is not a public good to warrant a change to land use. No other agency in the Puget Sound region supports that position.

Our neighborhood-162-petitioners-are requesting that the land use policies and map be examined for the Lake Burien Neighborhood based on the findings of the 1997 EIS, Burien's 2005 response to the PSRC, lack of adequate planning and funding for facilities for the area and based on its status as a shoreline with critical areas.

To the members of the Planning Commission and the City Council:

Ever since Burien elected to incorporate as a city, the majority of the Lake Burien Neighborhood and Lake Burien Shore Club members have clearly stated that the character of their neighborhood was low density residential. Additionally for the protection of the lake, its wetlands and its water quality and Miller Creek's water quality, the land use in the Lake Burien neighborhood should be low density. They went on the record in 1996, 1997, 1999, 2008, 2009, 2010, 2011 and 2012 stating this position on land use. Now that the Comprehensive Plan and its Land Use Map are open for revision, we are requesting this again. As long as the Plan remains open, citizens have a right to request that land use be examined. Mr. Greenberg stated at the July 12, 2011 meeting that this could be possible. **The Lake Burien Neighborhood has met the timeline for this request in 2012.**

When this request was put on the docket in 2010, the City Staff that prepared the material for the request presentation to the Planning Commission included several inaccuracies in their presentation that resulted in an inaccurate perception of the situation. These inaccuracies included:

1. current density of land use
2. misinformation on wetlands and how they are measured
3. an inaccurate map of the Lake Burien Neighborhood, Lake Burien and its critical areas
4. misinterpretation of how Growth Management Numbers are required for a city by the Puget Sound Regional Council
5. error in not consulting the EIS and the required mitigations for the Lake Burien Area
6. inaccurate information on the surrounding neighborhoods
7. misinformation on the adequacy of the current facilities that the city has for the area.

While the staff later corrected some of these inaccuracies, some of the Planning Commissioners still remained confused about what were the real facts for this request for a change to the Land Use Map.

Further on, some City Council members remained confused about the whole process of what criteria was to be considered in voting on an amendment to a Land Use Map. They then voted on the Lake Burien Neighborhood request based on what they believed was a Growth Management Board decision on the Burien Comprehensive Plan. It turns out that this case never existed and was never ruled on.

The conditions for the Lake Burien Neighborhood have markedly changed since that request was considered in 2010. The changes are:

1. The water quality of Lake Burien significantly declined in late 2010 and 2011 due to inadequate storm water management facilities for the area. The city has neither the money nor the resources to remedy this problem or to adequately upgrade the facilities in the next 10 to 15 years-if ever. The floodings and algae problems continue to be evidence of this inadequacy.
2. Evidence has been provided that clearly shows that the Growth Management Board never heard or made a ruling on the case or voted on the situation that the Council based its vote on.
3. The City Staff clarified how growth management numbers were to be determined in the city at its January 24, 2012 Planning Commission Meeting.

The Lake Burien Neighborhood is requesting that the Burien Comprehensive Land Use Map be amended to show the Lake Burien Neighborhood as Low Density Residential as it meets the criteria for this change. It is requesting that its request be placed on the docket for 2012.

Recent History-

Ever since the incorporation of the City of Burien in 1993, the residents of the Lake Burien Neighborhood have always requested and contended that the land use of the neighborhood should be low density because of the character of the neighborhood and for the protection of the critical areas. When this amendment for a change to the land use map was submitted in 2010, the majority of the residents (160+) of the neighborhood signed a petition again requesting that the Lake Burien Neighborhood be classified as low density land-use.

This amendment request was submitted in 2010 to resolve the inconsistencies in the 2009 Burien Comprehensive Plan between the plan text policies and the land use map for the Lake Burien Neighborhood and to provide protection for the critical areas in the Lake Burien Neighborhood. Since that time some conditions have markedly changed that warrant that this request be brought forward again. Those conditions will be discussed in item K of this amendment request. It is our understanding that these criteria might need to be reexamined and it is for this reason that this request to change to the Burien Comprehensive Plan Land Use Map has been resubmitted.

On July 12, 2011, the question was brought up before the Planning Commission about whether the Lake Burien Neighborhood Land Use Map Amendment could be considered again. Starting at 59:99 of the video tape of the July 12, 2011 Planning Commission meeting, Mr. Greenberg stated that this request could be reconsidered in the future if the growth management numbers could be accommodated under the GMA. In December, 2011, the Burien City Council had allowed 100+ housing units to be lost due to the Group Health expansion project and at that point determined that no other neighborhood would have to agree to make up these lost units because the city had a surplus of units to meet its GMA numbers. Back in 2010, the argument that the city staff had advanced was that if even one housing unit was lost, the Lake Burien Neighborhood amendment did not meet Criteria J and could not be allowed to be passed/approved. At the January 24, 2012 Burien Planning Commission Meeting starting at 1:08:32 of the video tape, Mr. Greenberg discussed that the way that the city had interpreted the GMA numbers for requests for changes to the Comprehensive Plan was going to be redefined. Furthermore in 2010, the City Council referred to a case that they claimed was argued before the Growth Management Board that required that Burien change its Comprehensive Plan and map in 1999. Based on that 1999 case, the City Council denied the amendment for the map change. However, the Growth Management Board has confirmed that there was no sure case in 1999 and therefore, the Growth Management Board had not made any such ruling. Additionally, other documents and sources of information have been revised, updated or newly developed by the city that warrants a reconsideration of this request.

Burien Municipal Plan Amendment Criteria

The following series of responses will follow the list of criteria as documented in the **Burien Municipal Code, 19.65.095 Comprehensive Plan Amendments, Item 4. Criteria** (Page 65-21 & 65-22).

A. The request has been filed in a timely manner.

A citizen letter was sent to the Burien Planning Commission requesting that this item be added to the 2012 Comprehensive Plan docket for a change to the Comprehensive Land Use Map for the Lake Burien Neighborhood. The request was submitted in a timely manner as verified by Scott Greenberg/Burien Director of Growth and Development.

B. There is a public need for the proposed amendment.

Under RCW 36.70A, there is a requirement for consistency throughout the comprehensive plan text and maps as well as protections for Critical Areas. There is a public need for this proposed amendment because the policies stated in the **2009 Burien Comprehensive Plan, 2.2 LAND USE ELEMENT, Residential Neighborhoods, Goal RE.1, Pol. RE 1.5** (page 2-8) do not appear to be consistent with the Comprehensive Plan Land Use Map for the Lake Burien neighborhood. As a result of these inconsistencies, there appears to be a disregard for the protections of Critical Areas as required by RCW 36.70A (The Growth Management Act). The protection of critical areas and the need for lower density land use is recognized in sections **RCW 36.70A.020, 36.70A.060, 36.70A.170, 36.70A.172, 36.70A.175 and 36.70A.480**. The **King County Comprehensive Plan, which serves to guide County-wide Planning Policies, recognizes the importance of Critical Areas in Chapter 1-Regional Planning and Chapter 4-Environment**. The **2011 Burien Comprehensive Plan, 2.2 LAND USE ELEMENT, Natural Environment, Wetlands, Goal EV.6, Pol. EV 6.1** (page 2-33) states: *“The City shall protect its wetlands with an objective of no overall net-loss of functions and values.”*

Also, the **2011 Burien Comprehensive Plan, 2.2 LAND USE ELEMENT, Land Use Conflicts, Pol. PI 1.6** (page 2-39) states: *“If there is a conflict between the comprehensive plan land use map and the land use designation policies, the land use designation policies control.”*

In all of the previously mentioned documents, the requirement of Best Available Science is required when dealing with Critical Areas. In a review of the Best Available Science for protecting, saving wetlands and other critical areas, the following strategies were cited:

1. limiting uses,
2. avoiding development in some areas,
3. transferring development density to another site, and
4. public protection of the critical area as a valuable site
(MRSC-Best Available Science-Critical Areas, 4/10).

While buffers and mitigation have been strategies used to protect wetlands and critical areas, they have been proven not adequate to prevent “no net loss” to these critical areas (King County website, PSWSMRP, “Wetlands and Urbanization”, Azous and Horner, 1997) . Pollutants reach wetlands mainly through runoff (PSWQA 1986; Stockdale 1991). Urbanization of wetlands and the watersheds that feed wetlands generate large amount of pollutants such as eroded soils from

construction sites, toxic metals and petroleum wastes from roadways and nutrients and bacteria from residential areas. *“At the same time that urbanization produces larger quantities of pollutants, it reduces water infiltration capacity, yielding more surface runoff.”*(Loucks 1989; Canning 1988). Additionally, residential development and the increased human usage of the land results in a significant impact to a critical area wetland and causes net loss. Increased amounts of impervious surface in residential areas on or adjacent to critical areas causes damage to wetlands, aquifer recharge areas and water quality. The currently released October, 2011 City of Burien Best Available Science Review states: *“Urbanization typically alters wetland hydrology by increasing or decreasing flows that enter the wetland from the surrounding landscape”* (page 37) and that *“...buffers are not likely to protect a wetland’s hydroperiod if they are located in a basin with impervious surface exceeding 15 percent.”* (page 38). *“...[A]erial photos clearly show impervious cover well over the 15 percent threshold, particularly in the Miller Creek basin.”* (page 38). The Lake Burien Neighborhood is located within the Miller Creek basin.

Therefore, another critical strategy that should be employed in the protection of urbanized critical areas and wetlands is to keep the land use of these areas at low density usage. This concept of low density usage is supported by the **2009 Burien Comprehensive Plan, 2.2 LAND USE ELEMENT, Residential Neighborhoods, Goal RE.1, Pol. RE 1.5, Low Density Neighborhood** (page 2-8) and should be reflected by land use designations at *“4 units per acre or less, due to the constraints posed by critical areas.”*

Additionally, under the Public Trust Doctrine, the water quality and the environmental preservation are considered as valid public trust issue. This is a simple but powerful legal concept that obliges all levels of government to manage natural resources in the best interest of their citizens, without sacrificing the needs of future generations (Science Daily, April 13, 2009). As a legal concept, it is well established in the United States at the state level and in federal agencies. Lake Burien is a critical area that falls under the domain of the Public Trust Doctrine.

In Chapter 5 (EIS) of the current Burien Comprehensive Plan, the Preferred Model that is discussed for land use is the low density land-use model, the No Action Model is the model that would retain the King County land use density that existed prior to the city incorporating. The other models mentioned are some variation on moderate to high density land use. (Chapter 5, 5-19 through 5-26). Environmentally sensitive areas (Chapter 1, 1-20) that are discussed in the document were later also referred to as critical areas.

Starting on page 5-26 of Chapter 5 titled 5.2.9 Environmental Analysis of the Alternatives, the impacts of each of the alternatives is discussed and the required Mitigating Measures are noted. Under Streams and Lakes (page 5-30), the Mitigating Measures call for low density in *“...the areas immediately abutting Lake Burien...”*. Under the topic of Wetlands, the Mitigating Measures are to use the Preferred Model to bolster the protection of wetlands. Lastly, under Surface Water Resources (page 5-29) of the Mitigating Measures, the Preferred Model is selected to reduce the *“...significant adverse impact on the management of storm water impacts within this basin.”* For these reasons, the Lake Burien Neighborhood was put into the Burien Comprehensive Plan as low density residential land-use. These portions of the EIS still remain effect in the 2011 Comprehensive Plan and as such should remain honored by the Land Use Map to ensure the consistency of the two documents.

The protection of the natural environment, water quality, critical areas and consistency in the comprehensive plan are well documented public needs.

C. The proposed amendment is the best means for meeting the identified public need.

The proposed amendment is the best means for meeting this identified public need of creating consistency throughout the comprehensive plan and maps and for protection of critical areas because land use is controlled by policy and map designation in the Comprehensive Plan. Additionally, this is the only legal mechanism for creating plan consistency and for maintaining low density residential development in a critical area such as the Lake Burien Neighborhood.

D. The proposed amendment is consistent with the overall intent of the goals and policies of the Burien Comprehensive Plan, Growth Management Act and Countrywide Planning Policies.

The proposed amendment is in agreement with the 2009 Burien Comprehensive Plan, Chapter 2:

A) 2.2 LAND USE ELEMENT:

- 1) Residential Neighborhoods, Goal RE.1, Pol. RE 1.5, Pol. RE 1.6
- 2) Natural Environment, Goal EV.1, Pol. EV 1.2, EV 1.8, Goal EV. 2, Goal EV.4, Goal EV.5, Goal EV.6, Pol. EV 6.1
- 3) Land Use Plan Implementation, Goal PI.1, Pol. PI 1.1, Pol. PI 1.2, Pol 1.5
- 4) Land Use Conflicts, Pol. PI 1.6
- 5) Phasing Uses and Densities, Goal PH.1, Pol. PH 1.1

B) 2.8 STORM WATER ELEMENT:

- 1) Protecting Water Quality, Goal ST.1, Pol. ST 1.10

The proposed amendment is in agreement with the Growth Management Act/RCW 36.70A:

- 1) Planning goals, 36.70A.020
- 2) Definitions, 36.70A.030
- 2) Natural resources and critical areas, 36.70A.060
- 3) Comprehensive plans-Mandatory elements, 36.70A.070
- 4) Natural resource lands and critical areas, 36.70A.170
- 5) Critical areas-Designation and protection-Best available science to be used, 36.70A.172
- 6) Wetlands to be delineated in accordance with manual, 36.70A.175
- 7) Shorelines of the state, 36.70A.480

The proposed amendment is in agreement with King County Countywide Planning Policies:

- 1) Chapter 1-Regional Planning
- 2) Chapter 4-Environment

The Puget Sound Regional Council has recently released its Vision 2040 which includes an increased emphasis on environment protections.

E. The proposed amendment will result in a net benefit to the community.

The proposed amendment will result in a net benefit to the community by having a Comprehensive Plan that is internally consistent in both text and maps. The **2009 Burien Comprehensive Plan, 2.2 LAND USE ELEMENT, Land Use Plan Implementation, Goal PI.1, Pol. PI 1.1** (page 2-37) states: *“The Comprehensive Plan, development regulations, function plans and budgets should be mutually consistent and reinforce each other.”*

Goal PI.1, Pol. PI 1.2 (page 2-37) states: *“The City’s development regulations should be consistent with other City plans and activities, including other development requirements. Development regulations shall be clearly written and absent of duplicative, uncoordinated or unclear requirements.”*

Burien citizens and City staff who use the Burien Comprehensive Plan will not be confused by internal inconsistencies. Other city plans, development regulations, functional plans and budgets will also be consistent. In addition, the protection of the water quality, natural environment and critical areas in this part of the city will benefit the whole community and the State of Washington in its salmon recovery efforts. The waters from Lake Burien and its wetlands drain into Miller Creek which is a salmon producing creek.

The October, 2011 City of Burien Best Available Science Review addresses the issue of water quality and the types of buffers that are required to reduce the various kinds of pollutants that affect water quality (page 43).

F. The revised Comprehensive Plan will be internally consistent.

The revised Comprehensive Plan will be internally consistent because it appears to be inconsistent without this change. It will also be in compliance with the Washington State Growth Management Act (**RCW 36.70A.070 Comprehensive plans – Mandatory elements**) which mandates that a Comprehensive Plan *“...shall be an internally consistent document and all elements shall be consistent with the future land use map.”* Additionally, Chapter 5 of the Burien Comprehensive Plans requires that land-use density in the Lake Burien Neighborhood be kept low density for the protection of the critical areas per the requirements of Best Available Science.

G. The capability of the land can support the projected land use.

Best Available Science suggests that the carrying capacity of the properties around Lake Burien would not be negatively impacted if the properties are designated as *“Low Density Residential Neighborhood”*. This amendment reduces the current proposed density and land-use designation demands on the critical areas of the Lake Burien Neighborhood.

H. Adequate public facility capacity to support the projected land use exists.

RCW 36.70A.030 Definitions (12) states: *“‘Public facilities’ include streets, roads, highways, sidewalks, street and road lighting systems, traffic signals, domestic water systems, storm and sanitary sewer systems, parks and recreational facilities, and schools.”* This public facility capacity and infrastructure already exist to support the projected land use of *“Low Density Residential Neighborhood”*. However, based on the city’s May, 2012 Drainage Master Plan, the storm water facilities in the Lake Burien Neighborhood are inadequate to handle storm water as has been demonstrated in the recent past and there appears to be no funding in the next 5-10 years to correct these inadequate facilities. Additionally, there are no future plans to require Low Impact Development (LID) in the Lake Burien Neighborhood or in its watershed in the next 5-10 years, as stated in the Drainage Master Plan.

The city does have the resources to support the change to low density land use by simply making the required change to the land use map, doing mailings to impacted residents and the staff time

involved in the cost of implementing this amendment. The city also has mechanisms in place to do these clerical items in a low cost effective manner.

I. The proposed amendment will be compatible with nearby uses.

The proposed amendment will be compatible with nearby uses which are mainly residential. The Lake Burien Neighborhood is adjacent to the Seahurst Neighborhood on two sides. The Seahurst Neighborhood is low density residential. The amendment will simply reduce density in an already residential neighborhood. The area to be changed on the map is currently adjacent to properties already classified as a “*Low Density Residential Neighborhood*”. The amendment will simply resolve an internal inconsistency on a map for a residential neighborhood that is currently defined classifiable as a “*Low Density Residential Neighborhood*” by 2011 Comprehensive Plan policy text and will protect the critical areas of the Lake Burien Neighborhood which was intended and is still intended in the language of the EIS/Chapter 5 of the Burien Comprehensive Plan.

J. The proposed amendment would not result in the loss of capacity to meet other needed land uses such as housing.

The city staff noted in report on the 2010 request for a Change to the Land Use Map that this request would result in the loss of less than 20 units, this is not a significant loss as compared to the units lost as a result of the decision on the Group Health Project in 2011 and the revised position stated at the January 24, 2012 Planning Commission meeting. Burien has more than a sufficient amount of units to allow this amendment to pass and still meet its GMA numbers. Therefore, this proposed amendment would not result in the loss of capacity to meet other land uses such as housing.

K. For a Comprehensive Plan Map change, either of the two following are met:

i. Conditions have so markedly changed....

The following items and conditions have changed that warrant a re-examination of the land-use density of the Lake Burien Neighborhood:

1. Methodology for meeting the Puget Sound Regional Council Growth Management policy for calculating the capacity to meet other needed land uses such as housing.
2. City of Burien’s commissioned October, 2011 Drainage Master Plan.
3. City of Burien’s commissioned May 2012 Best Available Science Review for the Burien Comprehensive Plan Update.
4. Vision 2040 increased focus on environmental protection.

Also, when this request was put on the docket in 2010, the City Staff that prepared the material for the request presentation to the Planning Commission included several inaccuracies in their presentation that resulted in an inaccurate perception of the situation. These inaccuracies included:

1. Current density of land use
2. Misinformation on wetlands and how they are measured
3. An inaccurate map of the Lake Burien Neighborhood, Lake Burien and its critical areas

4. Misinterpretation of how Growth Management Numbers are required for a city by the Puget Sound Regional Council
5. Error in not consulting the EIS and the required mitigations for the Lake Burien Area
6. Inaccurate information on the surrounding neighborhoods
7. Misinformation on the adequacy of the current facilities that the city has for the area.
8. Water qualities in the lake deteriorating due to the inadequacy of the storm water management facilities that currently exist.

ii. The map change will correct a Comprehensive Plan designation that was inappropriate when established.

Since this is a 2012 Comprehensive Plan map change, the applicable designation criteria are met because a map change will correct an inconsistency between the 2011 Comprehensive Plan policy text and 2011 Comprehensive Plan map. The 2013 Burien Comprehensive Plan will also be in compliance with the Washington State Growth Management Act (**RCW 36.70A.070 Comprehensive plans – Mandatory elements**) which mandates that a Comprehensive Plan “...shall be an internally consistent document and all elements shall be consistent with the future land use map.” Also this change will correct the inconsistency between the land use map and Chapter 5 (EIS) stated mitigations that were required to be in place and are still required to be in place for the adoption of the current Burien Comprehensive Plan.

To the Burien Planning Commission;

Ever since the incorporation of the City of Burien in 1993, the residents of the Lake Burien Neighborhood have always requested and contended that the land use of the neighborhood should be low density because of the character of the neighborhood and for the protection of the critical areas. When this amendment for a change to the land use map was submitted in 2010, the majority of the residents (160+) of the neighborhood signed a petition again requesting that the Lake Burien Neighborhood be classified as low density land-use.

This amendment request was submitted in 2010 to resolve the inconsistencies in the 2009 Burien Comprehensive Plan between the plan text policies and the land use map for the Lake Burien Neighborhood and to provide protection for the critical areas in the Lake Burien Neighborhood. Since that time some conditions have markedly changed that warrant that this request be brought forward again. Those conditions will be discussed in item K of this amendment request. It is our understanding that these criteria might need to be reexamined and it is for this reason that this request to change to the Burien Comprehensive Plan Land Use Map has been resubmitted.

On July 12, 2011, the question was brought up before the Planning Commission about whether the Lake Burien Neighborhood Land Use Map Amendment could be considered again. Starting at 59:99 of the video tape of the July 12, 2011 Planning Commission meeting, Mr. Greenberg stated that this request could be reconsidered in the future if the growth management numbers could be accommodated under the GMA. In December, 2011, the Burien City Council had allowed 100+ housing units to be lost due to the Group Health expansion project and at that point determined that no other neighborhood would have to agree to make up these lost units because the city had a surplus of units to meet its GMA numbers. Back in 2010, the argument that the city staff had advanced was that if even one housing unit was lost, the Lake Burien Neighborhood amendment did not meet Criteria J and could not be allowed to be passed/approved. At the January 24, 2012 Burien Planning Commission Meeting starting at 1:08:32 of the video tape, Mr. Greenberg discussed that the way that the city had interpreted the GMA numbers for requests for changes to the Comprehensive Plan was going to be redefined. Furthermore in 2010, the City Council referred to a case that they claimed was argued before the Growth Management Board that required that Burien change its Comprehensive Plan and map in 1999. Based on that 1999 case, the City Council denied the amendment for the map change. However, the Growth Management Board has confirmed that there was no sure case in 1999 and therefore, the Growth Management Board had not made any such ruling. Additionally, other documents and sources of information have been revised, updated or newly developed by the city that warrants a reconsideration of this request.

When this request was put on the docket in 2010, the City Staff that prepared the material for the request presentation to the Planning Commission included several inaccuracies in their presentation that resulted in an inaccurate perception of the situation. These inaccuracies included:

1. Current density of land use
2. Misinformation on wetlands and how they are measured

3. An inaccurate map of the Lake Burien Neighborhood, Lake Burien and its critical areas
4. Misinterpretation of how Growth Management Numbers are required for a city by the Puget Sound Regional Council
5. Error in not consulting the EIS and the required mitigations for the Lake Burien Area
6. Inaccurate information on the surrounding neighborhood
7. Misinformation on the adequacy of the current facilities that the city has for the area.
8. Water qualities in the lake deteriorating due to the inadequacy of the storm water management facilities that currently exist.

Again, we would like to restate that since that time several things/sources of information have changed that warrant the reconsideration of this request-the new Drainage Master Plan, the new Best Available Science (BAS) document and decisions reached by the city staff and the Burien City Council.

We are requesting that this request for a change to the Comprehensive Plan Land Use Map be put on the docket for consideration. As most of the work has been done on this issue previously, there is little to not cost to the city for its consideration.

ORDINANCE NO. 563

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BURIEN, WASHINGTON, AMENDING THE CITY'S CRIMINAL CODE RELATED TO FALSE STATEMENTS TO POLICE OFFICERS AND 911 DISPATCHERS AND ADOPTING SECTION 9.100.400 OF THE BURIEN MUNICIPAL CODE

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BURIEN, WASHINGTON DO HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. BMC 9.100.400 is hereby adopted to read as follows:

9.100.400 Making a false or misleading statement to a law enforcement officer or to a 911 dispatcher.

(1) A person is guilty of making a false or misleading statement to a law enforcement officer or to a 911 dispatcher, if he or she:

(a) Knowingly makes a false or misleading material statement to a law enforcement officer; or

(b) Calls the telephone number 9-1-1 and knowingly makes a false alarm or complaint or reports other false information that could result in the dispatch of emergency or law enforcement services.

(2) As used in this section:

(a) "Material statement" means a written or oral statement reasonably likely to be relied upon by a law enforcement officer in the discharge of his or her official powers or duties;

(b) "Law enforcement officer" means any general authority, limited authority, or specially commissioned Washington peace officer or federal peace officer, as those terms are defined in RCW 10.93.020, and other public officers who are responsible for enforcement of fire, building, zoning, and life and safety codes.

(c) "911 dispatcher" means any person who answers calls to the telephone number 9-1-1 for the purpose of dispatching emergency or law enforcement services.

(3) Making a false or misleading statement to a law enforcement officer or to a 911 dispatcher is a gross misdemeanor.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall take effect five days after publication.

I. INTERNAL CITY INFORMATION

A. 2012 Winter Recreation Program Participation

The Parks, Recreation & Cultural Services' (PaRCS') Winter Quarter wrapped up with 1,989 individuals registered for classes who participated in 17,038 hours of recreation. This is a 17% increase in registrations compared to the same period in 2011. Additionally, 2,963 individuals participated in 'drop in' programs, which represent both special events and activities that don't require any pre-registration. Examples of drop-in programs include the Tot Spot indoor playground, weekly card-playing for seniors, the Battle of Burien Break Dance for young adults, the after-school program for middle school-age youth, and volleyball for adults. These drop in programs resulted in an additional 10,132 hours of recreation participation for these individuals.

B. StartZone Event held at Community Center

A federally funded program located at Highline Community College held an open house in the community center's Seahurst Room on May 18. Known as "StartZone", the program assists individuals interested in starting small businesses. Approximately 250 people attended the event and twenty-seven vendors from Burien, SeaTac, Des Moines, White Center, and Federal Way displayed and sold products to the attendees.

C. Other Cities Request Consultations with PaRCS Staff

Recently staff from the City of Fife requested consultations with PaRCS' parks operations and maintenance staff concerning Burien's management of its grounds maintenance program. City of Fife is looking to contract out a portion or possibly all of its grounds maintenance services. Burien is seen as a model by the Washington Recreation and Parks Association (WRPA) for the use of privately contracted grounds maintenance and our experience with bid process and contract management procedures are regarded as good examples of best practices in this regard. Requests for similar information have also come from the City of Dupont, and out of state.

D. Rapid Ride "F" Line Proposed Route and Stops (Page 105)

The King County Council has begun consideration of the route and stops for the Rapid Ride "F" Line between the Burien and Renton Transit Centers. In Burien, the "F" Line is proposed to follow the route of Metro 140: along 4th Ave. SW between the Transit Center and SW 156th Street, and along SW 156th Street between 4th Ave SW and Des Moines Memorial Drive. The proposed route map, description of the service, and a transmittal letter from Dow Constantine to the County Council is attached. The transmittal letter was downloaded from the County Council's meeting packet. A signed version on County letterhead is not available as this is how items are customarily transmitted to the County Council.

E. Annexation Informational Forum Held

On June 21, staff held the first City-sponsored annexation informational forum at 3.14 Bakery in the White Center Business District. Of the 30 people in attendance, most were residents and business owners in the North Highline Unincorporated Area. Questions covered a range of issues from taxes, code enforcement, public safety and representation on City government to the fireworks ordinance.

The next forum is on July 12, at 6 p.m. at DubSea Coffee, 9910 8th Ave SW. The City will also have a booth on July 21 (10 a.m. – 8 p.m.) at the Jubilee Days Street Fair in the White Center Business District. Staff will answer questions and pass out informational brochures including copies in Spanish, Vietnamese, Cambodian and Somali. These translations are available online at www.burienwa.gov/annexation where viewers can get the most up-to-date information. The public is encouraged to email annexation@burienwa.gov or call (206) 436-5555 with questions and/or comments.

F. Ballot Drop Box Installed at City Hall

On June 26 a crew from King County Elections installed a 4' x 5' metal Ballot Box on the sidewalk on SW 152nd St., just to the west of City Hall in front of Town Square Park. The Ballot Box is securely bolted to the sidewalk and is one of 12 that have been installed throughout the County at City Halls or Libraries. They will be left in place year round but will only be available for use 18 days before the November General Election, the August Primary Election and the Special Elections in February and April. Beginning 18 days before each election, a King County staff person will come by several times a day to pick-up the ballots. On Election Day a staff person will be on-site at each location to answer any questions voters may have. The boxes will also be available for use for local elections within the Municipality in which they are installed. G. Update: District Court Hearing Reminder Calls

The City's front desk volunteer began making calls last month to Burien defendants to remind them of their upcoming District Court misdemeanor hearings. When defendants fail to appear for their hearing, a warrant is issued for their arrest which increases related costs. Preliminary data shows that the calls are effective in getting defendants to attend their hearings. Last year at this time approximately 26% of the hearings had no-show defendants, resulting in warrants being issued. This has been reduced to 13.5%, slashing the number of warrants issued in half. The District Court is also considering sending letters to those defendants who did not appear for their hearing to advise them that a warrant was issued for their arrest and provide information regarding how to remove the warrant. Staff will continue to review the data.

H. New King County Regional Veterans Treatment Court Launched June 14

King County District Court put a Regional Veterans Treatment Court in to action on June 14 that is available to Burien and other cities. This court is similar to the regional Mental Health court and shares the same judge. The purpose of the Veterans Treatment Court is to serve the veterans and the public by:

- addressing the underlying issues that have resulted in the veteran being in the criminal justice system;
- providing a courtroom environment that is supportive and respectful of the veteran and the victim, and that is conducive to reaching a successful outcome in every case; and
- striving to increase public safety through a collaborative team-based approach that incorporates individualized treatment plans, close monitoring, and creative approaches to resolve difficult issues.

I. Human Resources Manager Re-Elected to AWC Employee Benefit Advisory Committee

Human Resources Manager Angie Chaufy was recently re-elected to a three year term to the Association of Washington Cities Employee Benefits Advisory Committee (EBAC). The EBAC provides direct guidance and input to the AWC Board of Trustees regarding the programs, provisions and operations of the Employee Benefit Trust. Committee members are nominated and elected by the Mayors of the jurisdictions in their district. Angie has served on the Committee since 2001.

J. Wellness Program Update

During the last quarter, the Wellness Program sponsored the following events:

- Go! Program – 13 out of 15 employees completed the 12 week program aimed at establishing a healthier lifestyle through regular exercise and the elimination of one discretionary calorie per day. Statistics: Collectively, the employees lost over 70 pounds and exercised 52,982 minutes in 12 weeks. That is an average of 320.5 minutes per employee per week.
- Diabetes & Nutrition Wellness Workshop – 10 employees participated.

- 10 Strategies for Improving Your Finances Wellness Webinar – 10 employees participated.
- Online Banking Security Wellness Workshop – 10 employees participated.
- On-site Health Screening – 29 employees participated.
- Lunchtime Hoop Shoot – 37 employees participated.

The Wellness Committee seeks to offer a variety of activities and interventions that target the primary health risks and interests of our employees, specifically stress, depression, weight, and physical fitness. To this end, a combination of awareness activities, health education, motivational activities, behavior change programs, and cultural support activities are offered.

K. Good2Great (G2G) Organizational Development Follow-up

All regular status employees have recently completed an 8 hour G2G training focused on various components of employee excellence: attitude, self-talk, responsibility for choices, tools of growth, goal setting, and good decision making skills and/or a 16-hour Values Based Leadership Class. Using our identified organizational values of Trust, Integrity, Communication, Service, Collaboration and Excellence as the foundation, the Values Based Leadership class provided practical coaching, conflict management, recognition, and employee development tools to better enable our supervisors to “walk the talk”. As a follow-up to these trainings, staff members met to discuss various ways to keep G2G alive and in the fore-front of our organization. Voluntary follow-up activities will include:

- A lunchtime Investment in Excellence Chapter of the Month Club.
- Accountability Partners.
- On-going departmental activities and discussions.
- Monthly value highlighted through Slog Award Recognition Program.
- Development of a G2G intranet resource page.

II. COUNCIL UPDATES/REPORTS

A. Letter from Councilmember McGilton to King Conservation District (KCD) (Page 111)

Attached is a comment letter signed by Councilmember McGilton that was sent to Sarah Hemphill, Executive Director of King Conservation District, with a request that the KCD use some suggested guiding principles in the development of a new revenue system.

B. Community Animal Resource and Education Society (C.A.R.E.S) Follow-up

At the June 18 City Council meeting, Councilmember Edgar asked for the estimated cost to hire professional contractors to finish the construction on the new C.A.R.E.S. facility. The estimated cost is \$4,500 and C.A.R.E.S. is relying on volunteer services for most of the remaining work. For more information, contact Debra George at (206) 812-2740.

C. Construction Permit Updates

A construction permit was issued on June 15 for the placement of a portable classroom building at Cedarhurst Elementary School.

Construction permits were issued on June 25 for construction of the new Fire Station 29 located at 135 S Normandy Road in Burien. The project is valued at approximately \$4 million. Neeley Construction is the general contractor and the project is being managed by Harris & Associates.

The last of 18 houses constructed at the Chestnut Hills development received occupancy approval on June 26. According to the contractor, all but two of the homes have been sold. The development is located on 5th Place South near South 140th Street.

Attachment B: Burien-SeaTac-Tukwila-Renton RapidRide (F Line)

The F Line travels ten miles between the Burien and Renton transit centers. Along its path, it serves major employment, commercial and retail centers in Burien, SeaTac, Tukwila and Renton. The F Line connects with Link and Sounder trains, Sound Transit Regional Express, RapidRide A Line and other bus routes that serve regional and local destinations.

The F Line will replace Metro's Route 140. Between the Burien Transit Center and Tukwila Sounder Station, the F Line will follow the current Route 140 routing serving neighborhoods and employment along South 156th Street, the Tukwila International Boulevard Link Station, Southcenter Boulevard, Westfield Mall and the surrounding commercial area. From the Tukwila Sounder Station, the F Line will operate along the Strander Boulevard extension (when completed), Oakesdale Avenue Southwest, Southwest 16th Street, Lind Avenue Southwest, Southwest 7th Street, Rainier Avenue South, and the South 2nd/3rd Street couplet to and from the Renton Transit Center.

Stop Spacing

F Line stops are an average of 2,250 feet apart, just under one-half mile (0.45 mile). Stops are spaced closer together along segments where the F Line is the only service and less frequently on segments served by other Metro routes.

Station Locations

Stations serving both directions of travel will be located at or near the following eight intersections. Station locations may be altered due to design limitations.

- Southwest 148th Street at 4th Avenue Southwest (Burien Transit Center)
- South 154th Street at International Boulevard (Tukwila International Boulevard Link Light Rail Station)
- Southcenter Boulevard at 62nd Avenue South
- Andover Park West at Baker Boulevard
- Longacres Way at Nelson Place (Tukwila Sounder Station)
- Rainier Avenue South at Southwest 7th Street
- Logan Avenue South at South 2nd Street (Renton Transit Center)


In addition to RapidRide stations, about eighteen pairs of intermediate RapidRide stops will be sited along the F Line alignment.

Potential North Renton Extension

At the request of the City of Renton, King County Metro has explored extending the F Line 1.75 miles to "the Landing," a mixed use development in North Renton. This extension would serve additional Boeing Company worksites in North Renton, including the 737 assembly plant. The preferred extension alignment to the Landing is via Logan Avenue and Garden Avenue North to a terminal on North 10th Street between Garden and Park Avenue North. The return routing is via Park Avenue North to Logan Avenue. The North Renton extension would include a single RapidRide station on North 10th Street at Park Avenue North. In addition to the RapidRide station, three intermediate stops would be located along the extension.

The extension to North Renton adds eight to 10 minutes to the F Line's running time and is not budgeted. Additional operating funds or restructure and reinvestment of Metro's Renton-area bus routes are needed to extend the F Line to North Renton.

Until additional resources or service restructure options are identified, the F Line will operate between the Burien and Renton transit centers as originally planned. Metro will design infrastructure and facilities along the North Renton extension and will plan for the construction and implementation of the infrastructure and facilities when additional operating funds become available or service restructure options are identified.

Enclosed for your consideration is an ordinance establishing recommended alignment and station locations for the Shoreline-Seattle (E Line) and Burien-SeaTac-Tukwila-Renton (F Line) RapidRide lines. The E and F lines are scheduled to begin service in September 2013, the last of the six currently-planned RapidRide lines. The routing and station locations described in the ordinance need to be established to provide sufficient time to design and engineer the elements of RapidRide that set it apart from other Metro services. Metro must also obtain permits, finalize agreements with local jurisdictions for use of existing fiberoptic communication networks and construct RapidRide infrastructure and facilities, which includes shelters, real-time passenger information, off-board fare transaction processors and transit signal priority.

Transit Now, established by King County Ordinance 15582 and public vote on November 7, 2006, created the RapidRide bus rapid transit program. The Transit Now ordinance provided for RapidRide service along five designated high-ridership corridors in King County: Pacific Highway South, Bellevue-Redmond, West Seattle-Downtown Seattle, Ballard-Uptown-Downtown Seattle, and Shoreline-Downtown Seattle via Aurora Avenue North. Subsequent action by the King County Council, as part of Ordinance 16717, provided for the continued funding of the RapidRide program and included the addition of a sixth RapidRide line on the corridor between Burien and Renton via Tukwila and SeaTac.

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Implementation of the RapidRide E and F lines is consistent with King County's adopted values for the transit system—to emphasize productivity, ensure social equity and provide geographic value. The RapidRide program is guided by the Strategic Plan for Public Transportation 2011-2021 and associated King County Metro Service Guidelines. Metro's strategic plan aligns public transportation activities with the goals, objectives and strategies identified in the King County Strategic Plan 2010-2014. Higher frequency, combined with faster and more reliable service on RapidRide E and F lines, will tie together diverse communities and connect neighborhoods to employment opportunities, commercial and retail centers and recreational activities.

Both the RapidRide E and F lines support economic development and respond to local jurisdictions' efforts to develop vibrant, thriving and sustainable neighborhoods and communities. The E Line connects residential and commercial areas along Aurora Avenue North with our region's largest urban center, downtown Seattle. The F Line connects residential areas with south county employment concentrations at Sea-Tac Airport, Westfield Southcenter Mall and Boeing sites in Renton. Currently, King County Metro has the operating funds to operate the F Line to the Renton Transit Center. Metro has the capital funding but is still seeking operating funds for the planned F Line extension that would provide 9,000 Boeing employees new commute options to the 737 production plant and office buildings that house company environmental and other support sections. The extension will also serve The Landing, a new \$300 million urban village-style mixed-use development. The Landing features 600,000 square feet of retail stores, a 14-screen cinema, restaurants and cafes, and almost 900 apartment homes. Metro believes that it is prudent to establish the routing for the F line including the extension to the Boeing plant and the Landing now to better enable seeking funding for this extension.

The alignment recommendations described in the attachments to this ordinance are the product of collaborative work between Metro, local jurisdictions, employers and the public. As September 2013 approaches, Metro will continue to engage the community in the E and F line implementation process. Metro will work with stakeholders to seamlessly integrate the E and F lines with other transit services and balance the often-competing goals and objectives of the transit system. Metro will work to make the transit network more efficient and cost-effective, an essential task in this challenging fiscal climate. Metro will also prioritize the unique mobility needs of those who depend on public transportation, while working to provide convenience that attracts those who have other travel options, in an effort to boost ridership.

Thank you for your consideration of the RapidRide E and F line alignment ordinance. This important legislation continues to move the transit system toward the recently-adopted vision, goals and objectives in Metro Transit's strategic plan.

Dear Ms. Hemphill:

Thank you for inviting me to the June 26, 2012, meeting of the King Conservation District (KCD) Advisory Committee meeting to provide input on the KCD current and future services and programs. I also appreciate that you met with me recently to discuss my views of funding. Unfortunately, I am unable to attend the Advisory Committee meeting. I am sending you, therefore, this comment letter and ask that you include it in the official record of the June 26 public hearing.

Burien and WRIA 9 (for which I Chair the Management Committee) have forged a strong partnership with the KCD to implement regionally significant natural resource conservation projects and programs consistent with our respective missions to conserve and restore natural resources. We look forward to continuing the partnership by working with the KCD as it solicits feedback from stakeholders on the needs and recommendations for a new system of revenue.

Given there are no specific proposals and recommendations for a rate or charge system available for comment, I am asking that the KCD use three guiding principles in developing the new revenue system. *The three guiding principles seek to keep funding levels as near equivalent as the current Assessment system and keep implementation of the City, WRIA, and KCD natural resource conservation work on track, coordinated, and in synch with our well established capital and operational programs:*

1. A rate and charge system should raise either *equivalent or greater revenue* as the previous Special District Assessment for participating local governments, WRIA salmon recovery plan implementation, and the King Conservation District.



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2. A rate and charge system should include a *consistent allocation of funding* as the previous Special District Assessment to WRIA salmon recovery plan implementation, member jurisdictions, and the KCD.
3. A rate and charge system should include a division of funding *consistent with the existing division of funding* to the WRIA salmon recovery plan implementation to WRIAs 8, 9, and the Snoqualmie watershed.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the KCD services and program needs. I look forward to continuing working with you.
