
General Election: Nov. 5

The two candidates with the greatest number of votes in the Aug. 6 primary will advance to the General Election where the winner will be determined. Since there are only two candidates for Pos. 5, they automatically advance to the General Election.

**Veteran Planner Named Community Development Director**

Longtime City of Burien planner Chip Davis has been selected Community Development Director from a group of 19 applicants.

Davis has been a planner with the City since 2002. Previously, he worked as a consultant for communications companies developing cell phone tower sites in Washington, Oregon and Idaho as well as upstate New York. He also was a transit planner with the Spokane Transit Authority for 15 years.

Davis has a bachelor's degree in planning from the University of Washington. He replaces Scott Greenberg, who last fall accepted a position with the City of Mercer Island.

**Legal Challenges Delay Multi-Family Project Near Seahurst**

The City of Burien has issued developers a clearing permit for the Westmark/Emerald Pt. 179-unit multi-family residential complex in a wooded ravine next to Seahurst Park. This permit allows land and vegetation clearing, installation of stormwater drainage systems, installation of sediment and erosion control systems and establishment of a construction entrance for the site.

The City and developer prepared an environmental impact statement which the clearing permit is based on. Legal challenges have been filed by a neighborhood group opposed to the residential development and have delayed

land-clearing work.

This multi-family housing project has a long history that started before Burien was a City. Neighborhood residents opposed the project on environmental grounds when it was under King County's jurisdiction.

After Burien incorporated in 1993, the new City Council and staff took actions affecting the development and the City was sued by the developer. Courts eventually ruled for the developer and a \$10.7 million judgment was imposed against the City.

**Council Approves Zoning Changes for North Burien**

The City Council on April 1 approved Ordinance 573 amending North Burien Zoning and adopting the 2012 Comprehensive Plan Text and Map Amendments.

The rezones in the North Burien area, which the City annexed in 2010, eliminate many of the inconsistencies in the former County zoning while also respecting the existing land uses currently in the areas.

The changes concentrate higher levels of residential development near the longstanding neighborhood commercial areas and focus commercial and residential activity into centralized locations at the main intersections of Ambaum Blvd. SW, 1st Avenue South, Des Moines Memorial Drive and Glendale Way.

The proposed zoning amendments allow construction of residential units in close proximity to commercial zones and mass transit. These amendments enable future developments to complement each other by concentrating the local goods and service uses near residential uses, thereby creating more walkable neigh-

borhood focal points.

Amendments to the land use elements of the Burien Comprehensive Plan include the following:

- Incorporates the North Burien Annexation area including amendments into the Comprehensive Land Use Map.
- Aligns goals and policies with Regional and County planning documents.
- Incorporates growth targets.
- Improves consistency of land use designation criteria and adopts a commercial node concept.
- Ensures goals and policies are consistent with best available science.
- Aligns text to match pending Shoreline Master Program adoption.
- Updates references to other local planning documents.
- Adopts zoning consistent with the Comprehensive Plan Map.

## WHALE OF AN ATTRACTION

On Saturday, April 13, several reports were made to the US Coast Guard that a whale had washed up approximately 5 miles south of Alki Point. The fin whale, not local to this area, was believed to have been struck by a container ship at sea and brought into the Puget Sound on the bow. As the ship slowed down the whale dislodged and floated until it washed ashore at the north end of Seahurst Park.

The whale quickly became an attraction as thousands from throughout the region came to Seahurst Park. Local park staff and volunteers from several organizations stood watch, answered the multitude of questions and kept the visitors away from the carcass until a plan for removal was established. An examination was conducted by personnel with Cascadia Research, Washington Dept. of Fish and Wildlife, and MAST Center of Highline Community College with coordination from National Marine Fisheries Science Center.

Global Diving & Salvage, Inc., the City of Burien and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) collaborated to form a plan to refloat and remove the dead whale from the shore. At high tide on the evening of Tuesday, April 16, the carcass was successfully removed from the beach and towed to the South Puget Sound area where it was handed over to NOAA. The remains are being allowed to decompose naturally. The skull will be acquired by the National Marine Mammal Laboratory and will likely be part of the marine mammal collection on NOAA's Seattle campus.


## City Installs Decorative Metal Banners Along 1st Ave. S

The City of Burien has installed a series of metal decorative banners on light poles along 1st Avenue South. The assorted-colored art pieces depict a series of hubcaps, stacked end-to-end, with the words "Burien's 1st Avenue."

"The banners were designed to reflect the character of the City's auto row, with its dealerships and other auto related businesses," said Brian Victor, City of Burien engineer for the 1st Avenue South improvement project. Victor said the metal banners were considered a better alternative to cloth banners which require frequent maintenance and replacement. The banners were installed on light poles between South 140th and South 146th streets, and possibly will be installed to South 160th Street at a later date.

Phase Two of the 1st Ave. S. improvement project, which covers the segment between South 140th and South 146th streets, is nearing completion on schedule and under budget. Improvements include new sidewalks (pictured below) curbs and gutters on both sides; new asphalt overlay; new signals and street lighting; undergrounding of overhead utilities; new storm drainage; and landscaping.

Phase One included the section between South 148th and South 160th streets. It was substantially completed in 2009, but the light poles were not installed until 2012.



## Storm-Damaged Waterfront Houses Successfully Demolished, Removed

Two severely storm-damaged waterfront homes near Three Tree Point that were deemed significant hazards to public safety and the environment were successfully demolished and removed this spring, thanks to the work and persistence of the City's Legal and Building departments.

The houses were uninhabitable and in danger of being carried out into Puget Sound where they could pollute the water and obstruct navigable waterways. In that case, the state Department of Ecology (DOE) and federal Corps of Engineers could assess fines totaling over \$10,000 a day.

Both homes needed to be torn down and removed before winter storms could cause further problems, but with demolition costs of up to \$100,000 each, no lending agency or individual was stepping forward to have the work done. Burien's Legal Department and the DOE were contacted by neighboring property owners who were very concerned about the situation.

City Attorney Craig Knutson, Building Official Jan Vogee and other City staff worked with property owners, mortgage companies, permitting entities and contractors to find a resolution. In one case, the City Attorney contacted Congressman Jim McDermott's office for assistance in pressuring Fannie Mae, the investor of one of the properties, to fund the demolition.

Additionally, legal action was taken and fines were imposed until the demolition was finally accomplished. In the other case, the property owner was deceased and the City Attorney pressured the lender and HUD to have the damaged house removed.

"Our Legal and Building staffs did a yeoman's job in getting this matter resolved," said Mike Martin, City Manager. "They were persistent in a very difficult situation and did not let up until the work was done."




BEFORE: This photo shows one of the storm-damaged houses before it was removed.

## NERA: Plan Progresses for Freeway Ramp, Stormwater Facility

The City and its partners have made progress on two key pieces of infrastructure in the Northeast Redevelopment Area (NERA). The first is a \$4.5 million regional stormwater facility project that will be under construction later this year. Full funding is secured and the design work is in its final stage. The stormwater facilities will serve roughly 40 to 60 acres of property in the NERA and will contribute to both stormwater management as well as water quality.

The second is a new eastbound off-ramp from SR 518 onto Des Moines Memorial Drive. The ramp will significantly improve the access to and circulation within the development area. This project has received full funding, roughly \$2 million, for the design phase and City staff and our partners are working to secure the construction funding. The City is also competing for up to \$5 million in additional planning and development funding from an FAA program for other infrastructure improvements in NERA.

The NERA property, directly under the airport flight path, is heavily noise impacted and has been underused for more than a decade. The stormwater improvements and off-ramp will facilitate creation of a 35-45 acre commercial development and airport-related cargo facilities. The project will produce jobs, commercial development and increase the City's tax base.

## Crime Problems in your Neighborhood

As the local cop, I occasionally get a frantic phone call regarding crime being “out of control in my neighborhood”. The caller then spends the next 10 - 15 minutes telling me about how a neighbor on their block had a burglar break into their home and steal the new big screen television and x-box and all the liquor in the secret bar downstairs.



My immediate thoughts are:

1. How does this one incident equate to a “crime spree out of control”?
2. When did this happen? (It’s surprising how often the response is “last year”)
3. Did the neighbors leave their new big screen container out at the curb announcing to the entire world there is new big screen available for whoever has the gall to break in and take it?
4. Finally, what are the names of your neighbor kids’ friends who just had a drinking party where they played x-box on a brand new big screen?

A little bit cynical, yes! Still, it’s amazing how often it unfolds just that way. Probably not the thought process you want to hear from the folks who are there to help you in your time of need. The officer who comes to your door may actually ask you those questions, but more likely he or she will conduct a complete investigation and try to put a scenario together that explains why your home was violated and who did it. At some point the officer probably will talk to you about what you can do to make your home a less attractive target for thieves.

He or she will talk to you about Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED), a concept that helps identify different things you can do to landscaping, lighting and even door and window locks that make your home more secure. The officer will also ask if you are interested in doing something positive to reduce the chances of a repeat event in your neighborhood. If your answer is yes, the officer will tell you about Block Watch.

Block Watches are the single most effective concept that will reduce crime in your neighborhood. Block Watches bring neighborhoods together in an organized effort to watch out for each other and “observe and report” suspicious activity to the police. By working together you will have an observant eye keeping watch, even if you are at work or away on vacation. It will change your thought process and help me reduce the number of frantic phone calls I get.

Also, National Night Out, which is dedicated to Block Watches and crime prevention, is coming the first Tuesday night of August. Call CSO Maraulja for registration and program requirements.

## EAGLE LANDING PARK FOREST RESTORATION

Some great improvements are happening at Eagle Landing Park. Thanks to a Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) Urban Forestry Restoration Project grant, the City of Burien PaRCS Department is conducting a substantial vegetative restoration project at the park.

The program provided three weeks of Washington Conservation Corps (WCC) services to assist at the park with the removal of invasive plants, including English Ivy, blackberry, holly and cherry laurel, and also included a crew from EarthCorps, which has been funded through a King Conservation District (KCD) grant program. Also, 18 volunteers from the community provided additional assistance.

The second phase of the restoration, adding more than 1,600 native trees and shrubs to the cleared areas, will occur in the fall. The work will be monitored by EarthCorps crews over a three year period, replanted as needed. ## IVY A Destructive Invader

Ivy, also known as English ivy, is a fast-growing vine that stays green year-round. Originally from England, it was planted in landscapes all around Highline. But now parks departments, landowners and volunteers are spending hours and big bucks to remove it.

Without our help, ivy will slowly turn our open space, forests and yards into ivy deserts - places where nothing but ivy and a few other invasive plants will grow.

To control ivy, first remove it from the base of trees. This saves the trees and reduces the number of new seeds produced. Dig the roots out of the ground around the tree, creating an ivy-free ring at least 5 feet away. Clear any other berry-producing branches growing on fences, structures, or slopes.

Second, tackle the areas on the edge of the ivy where it is the least dense - these will go fast, and keep it from taking over new areas. Then, tackle the thickest parts. Herbicides like Roundup don’t work on ivy because of the waxy leaves. Instead, ivy can be removed by hand with a thick pair of gloves, a pruning saw for the thick branches, a screwdriver to pry it from any structure it is on, and hand pruners for the long stems. Pull all the roots out of the ground to minimize regrowth.

### NEW BIKE RACKS COMING

Some 41 custom bike racks are being installed at various locations downtown and throughout the city.

The racks were purchased with funds from a \$10,000 grant from the Washington State Community Economic Revitalization Board. Officials from Walk/Bike Burien (WABI), a local group of bicycle enthusiasts, collaborated with City of Burien Parks, Recreation and Cultural Services staff to apply for and win the grant.

Since the grant was awarded, WABI members have toured and mapped the City, conducting an inventory of existing bike racks and sites for the new racks. WABI vice president Maureen Hoffman designed the custom rack that was produced by Urban Racks, a regional vendor.
