The Nov. 6 General Election will be an important election day not only for the nation, but for the North Highline and Burien communities as voters in North Highline vote on becoming part of the City of Burien.

We encourage North Highline residents to learn how annexation would affect them before voting Nov. 6. Information about the impacts of annexation can be found on the City's website. Residents can also attend one of our informational sessions on annexation being held this summer and fall. City staff members will be on hand to answer your questions.

North Highline Annexation Election Set for Nov. 6

Voters living in the unincorporated area of North Highline will cast ballots Nov. 6 on whether to annex to the City of Burien.

The Burien City Council on April 2 adopted a resolution that requests King County to place on the General Election ballot a proposition concerning annexation of the North Highline Area "Y" annexation area, which includes White Center, Top Hat, Beverly Park, Glendale, and portions of Boulevard Park, Riverton Heights and Shorewood. The annexation would increase the population of Burien by about 17,300, increasing total population to approximately 65,000 residents and making Burien the 15th largest city in Washington. The City would also gain a new business district in White Center, with its numerous ethnic restaurants, grocery stores and other small businesses. In 2010 the City of Burien annexed the southern portion of North Highline, which included the Boulevard Park and Shorewood neighborhoods, after residents there voted in favor of joining the City.

The Nov. 6 ballot measure will require a simple majority vote for approval. Only residents in the proposed annexation area are allowed to vote in the election. Residents must register to vote at least 30 days prior to an election. The annexation would likely take effect in 2013 if approved.

North Highline residents affected by the annexation are invited to attend one of several open house informational sessions the City is planning this summer and fall in the proposed annexation area. Watch the City's website at www.burienwa.gov for dates and more information.

Security Cameras Keeping Watch at City Hall/Library



Security cameras have been installed in and around the Burien City Hall/Library building. The internal cameras monitor the building's first-floor lobby and entrances but do not view the library's interior. The external cameras allow police to monitor the building exterior, Town Square Park, the parking lot and surrounding streets. The police can access the cameras from the precinct and their mobile laptops. The cameras were installed after several incidents involving young people who often gathered in the lobby and at the entrance. The City is encouraging them to use the adjacent Town Square Park as a gathering place.

A NEW TRANSPORTATION VISION FOR BURIEN

On May 7, the Burien City Council adopted the City's first Transportation Master Plan (TMP). Since May of last year a transportation consultant, Fehr and Peers, and the Transportation Master Plan Advisory Committee, a committee comprised of residents and transportation interest groups, have been hard at work analyzing Burien's transportation network to develop a new transportation vision for the City.

The TMP serves as a local function plan supporting the Transportation element of the Comprehensive plan, ensuring coordination between transportation decisions and the Land Use element of the Comprehensive Plan and identifying those transportation projects which support future travel trends while addressing our community values and fiscal resources. The Transportation Master Plan also compliments the Complete Streets Ordinance which was adopted by the City Council in October of last year.

In the past, Burien's streets have been expected to meet at any given time the demands of all transportation modes, which include autos, trucks, buses, bikes and pedestrians. In response to this challenge, the TMP adopts the concept of a "layered" transportation network. In a system of layered networks, individual travel modes are assigned to different segments of the overall network, in order to reduce potential conflicts inherent in trying to design all roadways to serve all users. Key roadways and segments of roadways have been designated as priority routes for each mode and multimodal levels of service have been established to determine their effectiveness in providing transportation mobility and connectivity within Burien.

Burien Public Works Director Maiya Andrews indicates that the adopted TMP will provide an evaluation framework for prioritizing future transportation system improvements and will ensure a future comprehensive transportation network with infrastructure and design standards that allow safe and convenient travel for all users, including pedestrians, bicyclists, motor vehicle drivers and public transit users.

The City of Burien requires pet owners to purchase/renew a license annually for all dogs and cats 6 months of age or older. Licenses are valid from July 1 until June 30.

State Awards \$4.5 Million in Grants for NERA Infrastructure Upgrades


The City of Burien received a timely strategic investment from the state this year, in the form of grants to plan and build the infrastructure in the Northeast Redevelopment Area (NERA) that pave the way for future development.

The City was notified it has been awarded \$3.5 million from state Dept. of Commerce Public Works Board and an additional \$1 million from the state Dept. of Ecology. In addition, the Legislature allocated \$250,000 in the Transportation Budget to begin the planning phase for an off-ramp from eastbound SR 518 onto Des Moines Memorial Drive to service the area that is planned for a mixture of light industrial, business park and commercial uses. The City anticipates receiving another \$5 million in federal funds that can be used for planning and design in the redevelopment area.

In 2010, the City in partnership with the Port of Seattle adopted a redevelopment plan and strategy for the 165-acre redevelopment area, located between 8th Avenue South, Des Moines Memorial Drive, and South 138th Street. The goal of the plan is to transform NERA from a mixture of vacant and underutilized urban properties to land uses that are compatible with operations at Sea-Tac Airport as well as existing and planned land uses, and that will provide economic benefits to the region. The recent grants will help fund construction of storm-water facilities in the vicinity of Miller Creek in the southeast portion of NERA, to provide water quality treatment and detention functions. The integrated storm-water facilities will be designed to support future redevelopment, including low-impact/green infrastructure technologies. Work on the storm-water facility will begin next year.

A portion of the Miller Creek trail will be built as part of the project. Habitat and community open-space areas in the creek corridor also will be enhanced.

Besides expanding the City's tax base, providing jobs and strengthening the region's economy, the project will benefit the Burien community

by preserving and enhancing natural features, habitat areas and water quality in Miller Creek, expanding the community's system of trails and open space for public use, and maximizing public investment by co-locating storm water treatment and management facilities with open space, trail use, and enhanced wetland and habitat functions.

A HEALTHIER, SAFER COMMUNITY

The City of Burien recently completed work under its Communities Putting Prevention to Work/Healthy Eating Active Living (CPPW/HEAL) grant. In 2010, the City joined the Healthy Highline Communities Coalition, which also included the cities of SeaTac, Des Moines, Normandy Park and the Highline School District, that formed to improve the health of the community.

The coalition received a CPPW grant from the Centers for Disease Control as part of the Healthy Eating Active Living initiative (HEAL). The grant program focused on preventing chronic diseases such as heart disease and diabetes and improving health outcomes. Efforts were focused on environments that support health through policy, systems, and environmental-level change that will have a long-term positive effect for our communities.

Under the grant, the City accomplished the following:

- Adopted a complete streets ordinance.
- Adopted zoning standards for community gardens.
- Prepared a Transportation Master Plan (recently adopted by the City Council).
- Established nutrition guidelines for City-sponsored meetings.
- Participated in Safe Routes to School study for Cedarhurst Elementary.
- Adopted healthy eating/active living policies in the Comprehensive Plan.
- Prepared new Parks and Trails Map.
- Received technical training on a variety of community health topics.
- Completed a food access survey and identified areas in Burien needing more healthy food options.

Seahurst Seawall Removal in Design and Permitting Phase

The Seahurst seawall removal project design and permitting phase is anticipated to be completed by August 2012. The extent of construction to occur in the park in 2012 is still unclear. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' funding needed to complete the project remains to be secured. City and Corps staff are anticipating a need to proceed with the project in a phased approach, utilizing funds that are available.

The advantage of this approach is that starting the construction of the project creates momentum, highlights the strong partnership between the City and Corps, as well as underscores the City's commitment to getting this important project completed. The disadvantage is that it may impact the park use over a few years, rather than all at once. The impacts would be reduced, since the entire north shore of the park wouldn't be under construction at one time. Currently, no construction is scheduled to begin prior to October 2012. Updates on the project's progress will be provided in future newsletters. The focus will be on what impacts from construction the public may experience.

SW 132ND STREET IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

On April 18 six sealed proposals were received for the SW 132nd Street Improvement Project. Notice of Award was given to West Coast Construction Company of Woodinville. West Coast Construction came highly recommended after doing several projects with the City of Bellevue. The work will get under way this summer and be completed by the start of next school year.

The project has two schedules of work:

- Schedule A includes 1,750 feet of sidewalk and storm improvements on the north side of SW 132nd Street between Ambaum Boulevard SW and 6th Avenue SW, and 300 feet of storm-water improvements on 8th Avenue SW (SW 132nd Street to SW 131st Street).
- Schedule B includes 350 feet of storm-water improvements on 8th Avenue SW (SW 131st Street to SW 130th Street), 400 feet of storm improvements on SW 130th Street (8th Avenue SW to Hermes Storm Detention Pond) and a hot-mix asphalt overlay on SW 132nd Street (Ambaum Boulevard SW to 6th Avenue SW). The project also includes concrete curb/gutter, driveway re-grading/concrete approach installations, and traffic control and channelization improvements.

This project is financed through the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program with funds obtained from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and City Capital Improvement Project funds.

Planting a Tree on Arbor Day

Arbor Day was celebrated on April 11 with the planting of a Garry Oak tree at Puget Sound Park, 135 SW 126th St. Arbor Day was founded by J. Sterling Morton of Nebraska who advocated setting aside a special day for tree planting. More than 1 million trees were planted in Nebraska on the first Arbor Day in 1872. At the ceremony, Burien was recognized for 11 years of membership with Tree City USA by a representative of Washington's Department of Natural Resources.

Carbon Monoxide Alarms Required in New Residences

A new state amendment to the building codes went into effect on April 1, 2012, requiring all new residential units to be equipped with carbon monoxide alarms. Most contractors install a combination smoke/carbon monoxide alarm when constructing new homes. Existing dwellings must also have carbon monoxide alarms installed when alterations, repairs or additions requiring a permit occur, or when one or more sleeping rooms are added or created. Plug-in type alarms are permissible and are available at any hardware store for about \$30.




Free Parks and Trails Maps

Parks and trails maps are being offered free to the public. The map covers Burien, Des Moines, Normandy Park, Renton, SeaTac and Tukwila. Copies are available at Burien City Hall and the Community Center.

HOUSING REPAIR LOANS

Low and moderate income Burien homeowners needing help with home repairs might be eligible for 0% loans with no monthly payment in the King County Housing Repair program.

Funding is provided for necessary, quality-of-life improvements, such as roof replacements, new septic system, or making living areas or entrances more accessible. To determine what repairs/modifications are eligible for funding, a Housing Repair Program staff person will perform an assessment at the property.



The loans are available for up to \$25,000 and at 0% interest. Grants are cash awards that do not have to be paid back. They are available for up to \$3,000 for homeowners and \$5,000 for mobile homeowners.

CRIME PREVENTION TIPS

Recently we've seen a rise of purse thefts. Incidents have been reported at grocery stores and parks.

So, what's been happening?

Ladies place their purse in their shopping cart, then turn around or walk away, not paying attention to the people around them. The bad guy quietly walks by and lifts the purse. The thief now has the victim's money, credit cards, address and house keys. While she is busy trying to find her purse, he is headed to her home.



Here are a few tips to keep you and your belongings safe:

- While shopping keep ahold of your purse and don't walk away from your cart. Put your wallet in your pocket. Look around and take note of who may be paying attention to you.
- When traveling down to the park or social events, make sure to put your things away before you get there. A bad guy may be watching as you pull into that parking lot. He takes note of movements that indicates to him that you just threw your wallet, purse or keys under the seat. If you plan on putting your things in the trunk, do so before you get to your destination.
- If your purse or wallet does get stolen, contact your credit and banks card companies immediately. Be sure to notify the three credit reporting agencies:

La votación para la anexión de North Highline será el 6 de noviembre

Los electores inscritos que viven en el área no incorporada votarán el 6 de noviembre para determinar si van a formar parte de la Ciudad de Burien. El área de la anexión incluye White Center, Top Hat, Beverly Park, Glendale, y partes de Boulevard Park, Riverton Heights, y Shorewood.

La anexión aumentaría la población de Burien en aproximadamente 17,300 residentes, aumentando así la población total a aproximadamente 65,000, lo cual convertiría a Burien en la ciudad número 15 en tamaño en Washington. La ciudad contaría con un nuevo distrito comercial en White Center, con sus numerosos restaurantes étnicos, abarroterías, y otros pequeños negocios. En 2010, la Ciudad de Burien anexó la parte sur de North Highline, después de que los residentes del área votaron por gran mayoría por unirse a la Ciudad.

La medida que aparecerá en la papeleta del 6 de noviembre se podrá aprobar por simple mayoría. Solo los residentes del área de la anexión propuesta pueden votar en la elección. Los residentes deben inscribirse para votar por lo menos 30 días antes de las elecciones. Si queda aprobada, la anexión probablemente entrará en vigor en 2013.

A los residentes de North Highline afectados por la anexión, se les invita a asistir a una de las sesiones informativas públicas que la Ciudad ofrecerá durante el verano y otoño en el área de la anexión propuesta. Para determinar qué reparaciones o modificaciones califican para recibir fondos, el personal del Programa de Reparaciones Caseras evalúa la propiedad.

Hay préstamos disponibles hasta \$25,000 sin intereses. Las subvenciones son dinero en efectivo que el beneficiario no tiene que devolver, y están disponibles por hasta \$3,000 para propietarios de casas o \$5,000 para propietarios de casas móviles.

Did you know that your Waste Management garbage service includes free recycling-whether you live or work in Burien? It's true! Burien homes, apartments, condominiums and businesses can receive FREE recycling service!

For businesses, apartments and condominiums, the City can:

- Set up your new recycling program. We can visit onsite to determine outdoor container placement.
- Educate tenants or businesses at your property. We can provide colorful fliers and signs to post inside with information about what is and is not recyclable.
- Provide information about special recycling of other materials – such as computers and fluorescent lights.

RECYCLING 101: These items are recyclable at home or at work in Burien, and can be placed in your recycling cart or dumpster:

Paper

- Clean paper and cardboard: Flattened cardboard, newspaper, magazines, catalogs, paper-back books, mail, food boxes.
- Paper food containers: Clean paper cups, milk and juice cartons, juice boxes, frozen food boxes.

Metal

- Aluminum and tin/steel cans, empty aerosol cans, scrap metal and small metal appliances (limit 2x2x2 ft., 35 lbs.) Rinse and empty cans.

Glass bottles and jars

- Glass bottles and jars. No caps or lids.

Plastic containers: Ignore the numbers - recycle plastics by their shape.

- Plastic cups, plastic bottles, plastic jugs, plastic jars and plastic tubs.
- No caps. No plastic bags.

Car Washing Can Be Harmful to the Environment

When you wash your car on a compacted surface, the runoff containing soap, heavy metals, road grime, greases, and oils can enter the storm drains.

Unlike sanitary drains, storm drains usually run directly into creeks, ponds, lakes, and the Puget Sound. Untreated runoff destroys aquatic habitat, harms fish, and degrades water quality. Even biodegradable soaps may be harmful to fish!



What Can You Do?

If you are washing your car at home, find a grassy area that will soak up the runoff before it can reach a drain or ditch. Conserve water! Use a spray gun with flow restriction to minimize water volume and runoff. Empty your wash buckets into sinks or toilets. Car wash kits are also available through the City.

Instead of washing your car at home, use a commercial car wash facility. Commercial car wash facilities are required to send their runoff into the sanitary sewer where it is treated at a treatment plant. Commercial systems are also designed to use less water per car than the average car wash at home and also reuse their water several times before sending it to a treatment plant.
